The purposes of this Association shall be:

- To organize, charter and supervise service clubs to be known as Lions clubs.
- To coordinate the activities and standardize the administration of Lions clubs.
- To create and foster a spirit of understanding among the peoples of the world.
- To promote the principles of good government and good citizenship.
- To take an active interest in the civic, cultural, social and moral welfare of the community.
- To unite the clubs in the bonds of friendship, good fellowship and mutual understanding.
- To provide a forum for the open discussion of all matters of public interest; provided, however, that partisan politics and sectarian religion shall not be debated by club members.
- To encourage service-minded people to serve their community without personal financial reward, and to encourage efficiency and promote high ethical standards in commerce, industry, professions, public works and private endeavors.

Mission Statement

To create and foster a spirit of understanding among all people for humanitarian needs by providing voluntary services through community involvement and international cooperation.

Official Colors

Purple and gold were chosen when the association was founded in 1917. The purple represents loyalty to country, friends, to one's self and to the integrity of mind and heart. It is the color of strength, courage and dedication to a cause. Gold symbolizes sincerity of purpose, liberality in judgment, purity in life and generosity in mind, heart and commitment to mankind. Often, a dark blue is used in place of the purple.

Official Emblem

The current Lion emblem (or logo) was adopted at the 1919 convention. Today, Lions worldwide are recognized by it. It consists of a gold letter "L" on a circular purple (or blue) field. Bordering this is a circular gold area with two Lion profiles facing away from the center. The Lions face both past and future - showing both pride of heritage and confidence in the future. The word "Lions" appears at the top, and "International" at the bottom.

Always wear your Lions emblem pin proudly. And remember, since it is a registered trademark in most countries, it may never be used for commercial or fundraising purposes without prior permission from the Legal Division at International Headquarters.

International Fellowship and Understanding

It may appear that the language barrier would make international understanding almost impossible. But international understanding and friendship (or fellowship) is a matter of spirit rather than language. Lions throughout the world communicate with one another through club activities that create and foster a spirit of understanding among the peoples of the world.


Lions Clubs International History Timeline

- **1917:** Association founded in Chicago, Illinois, USA on June 7 by businessman Melvin Jones.
- **1920:** Association became international with the formation of the first club in Canada.
- **1925:** Helen Keller challenges the Lions to become her "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness."
- **1931:** First club in Latin America chartered.
- **1945:** Association helps the Non-Government organizations section of the United Nations.
- 1947: First club in Australia chartered.
- **1948:** First club in Europe chartered.
- **1953:** First club in Asia chartered. First club in Africa chartered.
- 1968: Lions Clubs International Foundation "LCIF" was formed in 1968.
- **1976:** MD'A' District A-15 was formed on July 1st. The First Governor of A-15 was Dougald Campbell in1976-1977.
- **1987:** Lions Clubs International becomes the first service club to admit women as members. Women gained the right to full membership as a Lion.
- **1983**: Lions Foundation of Canada was founded and has since increased to over 45,000 sq. ft and has graduated over 650 Dog Guides.
- **1990:** SightFirst, a major blindness prevention initiative, is launched.
- **1998:** The DogGuide Breeding & Training facility, located in Breslau Ontario, was officially opened.
- **2003:** There are 10 Districts in Ontario at this time. There once were 14 Districts and 4 left to form MD"U". As of May, there were 15,104 members in Ontario.
- 2005: SightFirst II, is launched.

There are 52 clubs in District A-15. There is one Leo Club in District A-15. The 6 zones in District A-15 are 9-E,9-S,37-W, 37-S, 51-E, and 51-W.

- Prevented serious vision loss for 24 million
- Provided 65 million treatments for river blindness
- Restored sight to 4.6 million with cataract
- Improved eye care services for hundreds of millions
- Built or expanded 258 eye hespitais and clinics
- Upgraded 300 eye centers with equipment
- Trained 68,000 ophthalmologists, ophthalmic nurses, and other professional eye care workers
- Launched world's first-ever initiative to combat childhood blindness in partnership with the World Health Organization. Thirty pediatric eye care centers will be established.

SightFirst Facts



- An estimated 37 million people are blind today.
- At least 80% of blindness is reversible or could have been prevented.
- That is why Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), and 1.4 million Lions clubs members, are engaged in a global campaign to eliminate avoidable blindness.

What is the SightFirst program?

The mission of the SightPirst program is to significantly reduce preventable and reversible blindness worldwide but particularly in developing countries, where 90 percent of avoidable blindness exists. SightPirst grants are considered for projects that (1) result in a significant and measurable reduction in blindness in a specified region. (2) target the leading blinding diseases and/or address crucial unret eye care delivery needs at regional and national levels and (3) use costeffective and sustainable strategies.

- Lions have saved the sight of 24 million people worldwide through the SightFirst program.
- 2 The world looks to Lions as leaders in the International effort to eliminate avoidable blindness.

- 4 Lions made SightFirst possible by reising US\$143 million in Campaign SightFirst in 1991-1994 which increased to US\$200 million through investments and other donations.





Official District Governor Visitations

According to policy, District Governors are required to make an official visit to each club in the district. In general, the Governor will contact the club and arrange a mutually satisfactory date and time. After this is done, the club should write to the Governor and confirm the arrangements to avoid any possible confusion.

The Governor's official visit should not conflict with other programmes. He or she should be the only or at least the primary programme for the meeting. Thirty minutes should be allotted for the presentation, although the Governor may choose to make a shorter one. If you want the Governor to make award presentations, provide full details and strive to keep this part of the programme as short as possible. It is also permissible to have a brief business or board meeting, including committee reports. The Governor will likely also want to meet separately with your club's leadership either before or after the regular meeting. Make sure the time is scheduled in advance and all club leaders are informed and available.

In many respects, the Governor's visit is comparable to that of any Lion dignitary. The *Official Protocol* should be followed, and courtesy and respect should be shown at all times. Here are a few additional suggestions:

- When you write to confirm the date and time of the Governor's visit, it is helpful to send copies of the club's newsletter and other publications.
- Even though it's likely the governor will be arriving by automobile from a nearby location, he or she should be met personally at an agreed-upon location, even if it's only the entrance to a local restaurant.
- Although the Governor's expenses are paid by the association under specific rules of Audit, they may not fully pay the cost of the visit in certain highercost localities. In these instances, it is certainly appropriate for the club to offer to pay the difference in hotel rates and other expenses.

Official District Governor Visitations (cont'd)

- Some districts are very large, and even include more than one country. In these cases, it may be appropriate to arrange for the Governor to pay a courtesy call on the Mayor or other governmental official. If so, the media should be alerted. An alternative would be to invite governmental officials to the event itself, and perhaps have one of them offer an official welcome to the Governor.
- It may also be useful to invite the media to cover the Governor's speech, particularly if her or she had come a long distance. Media in smaller markets might also want to make note of any awards the Governor gives to your members. If you plan on contacting the media about the Governor's visit, you should ask for biographical information and photos in advance from the Governor or the district public relations chairman.

REGION CHAIRPERSON MD'A' POLICY MANUAL

The Region Chairperson shall be a voting member of the District Governor's Cabinet and shall be an active member of any District Membership, Extension, Retention and Leadership Committees, and shall:

- Be responsible to the District Governor for all their actions and act under the supervision of the District Governor displaying a positive leadership role at all times.
- Attend the meetings of the District Governor's Cabinet and the MD'A' Advisory Board
- Assist the District Governor by performing such duties assisting District committees, attending special functions or as may be delegated by the District Governor or as may be required under the provisions of the MD'A' Constitution and Bylaws.
- Play an active role in organizing new clubs and in strengthening struggling clubs.
- Submit any required reports to the Vice District Governor and District Governor within 10 days after each assignment.
- Be a mentor to the Zone Chairpersons in the Region assisting them with the activities of the Zone Chairperson and in the performance of their official duties including holding regularly scheduled meetings of their District Zone Advisory Committee.
- Assist the Zone Chairperson in arranging Joint Zone/Region Rallies and attending the same when called upon to do so.
- Attend all training opportunities, eg; leadership forums and institutions, MD'A' training, District Cabinet training etc; and promote same to the Lions in their regions.
- Assist the District Leadership Chairperson with leadership training within the District.
- Seek our future leaders.
- Encourage proper protocol.



Have you heard of these complaints from parents and teachers? The LIONS-QUEST PROGRAM can assist children and students as they grow into adulthood.

The life-skills curricula teach young people about character education, prevention, and service learning. Around the world, more than six million students, ages five to 18, have participated in the Lions-Quest Programs.

Skills for Growing (Primary Grades)

Clubs can also participate in recommended activities such as SODIS solar water disinfection and UNICEF's School-In-a-Box Program.

Lions Services For Children

In October 2003, the International Board of Directors approved the creation of a new international program called **Lions Services for Children**, focusing on health and education. In April 2004, the position of District Lions Services for Children (LSC) Chairperson was established to become effective with the 2004 - 2005 fiscal year. The duties of the District SLC Chairperson are as follows:

- Learn about the nature and scope of the health and education needs of children in the district.
- Learn the names of key individuals and organizations in the district concerned with meeting the health and education needs of the children.
- Maintain information about available print resources on children's issues, contacting the Lions Services for Children Department at headquarters for assistance, if needed.
- Invite educators and other community leaders to Lions Clubs meetings to discuss avenues of co-operation.
- Encourage Clubs to conduct community assessments of children's needs.
- Encourage Clubs to make services for children a community effort by involving municipal governments, local businesses, other organizations and, where appropriate, the children of the community.
- Generate publicity about Lions involvement as humanitarians so that others might join the efforts for the benefit of the children in need.

Diabetes Awareness & CDA Liaison

Over 2 million Canadians have diabetes and the number is expected to increase dramatically as the population ages. Among people of working age, diabetic eye disease is the most common cause of legal blindness in North America. Lions Clubs are primarily interested in controlling the causes of Type 2 Diabetes in order to reduce these new instances of blindness.

Lions can assist in slowing down the new instances of diabetes by educating first our own members and then the public of the symptoms and causes of Type 2 Diabetes. This can be best accomplished through liaison with the Canadian Diabetes Association (CDA). Our assistance can be through manpower or donation of funds or both.

The main symptoms of diabetes are:

- Unusual thirst
- Frequent urination
- Weight change (loss or gain)
- Extreme fatigue or lack of energy
- Blurred vision
- Frequent or recurring infection (cuts, bruises, slow healing)
- Tingling or numbness in the hands or feet
- Difficulty getting or maintaining an erection

Other factors that put people at risk are:

- Being age 40 or over
- Being overweight
- Having a family member who has diabetes
- Having had gestational diabetes (diabetes during pregnancy)

As you can see these factors fit the profile of many of our Lions members as well as many of our friends in the community. I would be delighted to visit your club or arrange for a volunteer from CDA to visit to further discuss how to minimize the symptoms and health dangers of diabetes. I would also encourage suggestions for best assisting CDA, realizing that all clubs are under tight financial pressures.

Lions are recognized internationally for their service to persons who are blind and visually impaired. This dedicated service began in 1925. During a Lions international convention, Helen Keller, a woman who had been blind and deaf since childhood, challenged Lions to become *knights of the blind in this crusade against darkness*. Lions accepted Keller's challenge. Today, Lions clubs around the world are involved in sight-related programs.

The following are the Adopted Sight Conservation and Work with the Blind Programs:

- Assistive devices, such as Braille books, translation software, wrist watches, board games, talking thermometers, talking currency identifies, beep sports balls, magnified reading glasses, easy-to-read telephones, and television screen magnifiers to aid people who are blind or visually impaired

Lake Joe is located 30 km south of Parry Sound on the east side fo Old Highway 69, 5 minutes north of Mactier.

The centre operates from May - September. Not-for-profit groups such as hospitals, retirement homes, youth groups etc. Are hosted during May and June. Seven weeks of the summer is filled with CNIB clients, both adults and children. Children with kidney disease, the Lung Association and deaf/blind adults also have the opportunity to enjoy the camp.

The land was an old train station where travelers would come by train, stay the night sleeping in the berths and be picked up by the boats the next morning. The manager's cottage is an original building that was the living quarters of the station manager and his family. The gazebo on the hill on the far side of the camp at one time was a restaurant for the train passengers.

In 1961, Lions Clubs of Ontario, the Canadian Council for the Blind and the CNIB merged resources. The Lions Clubs purchased land and the CNIB bought it from them for \$1.00. In addition the Lions Clubs donated over 80% of the funds required to erect the original buildings.

In 2002, the camp closed for a year to start major rebuilding and an aggressive fund-raising initiative was launched, with the Lions Family of MD'A pledging \$1 million.

McInnes house (the Group Home for Deafblind Persons Brantford Inc.) is a specialized program that promotes a partnership among the individuals with deafblindness and/or his or her advocate, the Intervenor, and the administration to develop, implement, and evaluate Individual Independent Living Programs. These are person centered programs designed to provide a setting for each person to receive communication and intervention which allows them to understand, interpret, and be part of the environment around them. Each program promotes the highest quality of life and independence.

Lions are men and women who volunteer their time to humanitarian causes. Founded in 1917, the volunteer organization's motto is "We Serve."

Service To Others

Worldwide, Lions clubs are recognized for their service to the blind and visually impaired. This service began when Helen Keller challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness" during the 1925 Lions Clubs International Convention.

Today, Lions extend their commitment to sight conservation through countless local efforts, as well as through their international Sight First Program and Lions World Sight Day, a global partnership of United Nations agencies, eye care and philanthropic organizations and health professionals, held the second Thursday of each October to increase awareness of the need to eradicate blindness. Lions also collect and recycle eyeglasses for distribution in developing countries year-round and especially during May, which is Lions Recycle for Sight Month. In addition, Lions make a strong commitment to young people through youth outreach programs. Lions also work to improve the environment, build homes for the disabled, support diabetes education, conduct hearing programs and, through their foundation, provide disaster relief around the world.

Based on a recent report of Lions clubs worldwide, it is estimated that each year Lions clubs donate approximately US\$506 million and 71 million hours, which is equivalent to 34,000 people working full time for a year.


MEMBERSHIP IN A LION'S CLUB IS AN HONOR & A PRIVILEGE BECAUSE IT IS BY INVITATION

Membership Categories: There are several categories of membership, which are fully explained in the Lions Clubs Standard Form Constitution and By-laws. In brief, they are:

- Active: A member entitled to all rights and privileges and subject to all obligations which membership in a Lions club implies.
- Member-at-Large: A member who has moved out of the community and is unable to regularly attend meetings and desires to retain membership in the club. This member cannot hold office or vote at conventions and must pay dues.
- Honourary: An honor bestowed by a club to an individual who is not a member of the Lions club, to recognize outstanding community service or service to the club.
- Privileged: A member who has been a Lion for 15 or more years, who because of illness, infirmities or advanced age or other legitimate reason, must relinquish his or her active status. A privileged member may vote, but may not hold office.
- Life Member: A member who has maintained active status for 20 or more years, or for 15 years and is at least 70 years of age can be granted Life Membership. Life Members pay a one-time payment to the association in lieu of future dues. They have all the right and privileges of membership.
- Associate: A member who holds his/her primary membership in another club, but maintains residence or is employed in the community of the club in which he/she attends.
 Associate members can vote on club matters, but may not serve as a club delegate at district, multiple district or international conventions, and are not eligible to held office.
- Affiliate: An individual who is currently unable to fully participate in the club, but wishes to support the club. He or she may not hold office and may not represent the club at district, multiple district or international conventions, but may vote on club matters.

District A-15 Team Game Plans

Guest Speakers

There should be only one guest speaker at a meeting. If you find that a district officer's official visit interferes with a previously scheduled speaker, contact the district officer immediately and ask if he/she would prefer to reschedule.

- Obtain a brief biography of the guest speaker and assign a Lion to perform the introduction.
- Greet the guest speaker on arrival, show him/her where they will be seated, and assign a Lion to accompany him/her during the social time.
 Never leave the guest standing alone in the room.
- Dinner and a refreshment are at the expense of the club.
- Your guest speaker should be on the agenda immediately after dinner.
- Ensure that everything is prepared for the guest speaker podium, microphone, lighting, tables cleared and bar closed.
- Neither the introduction nor the thank you should be longer than the guest's presentation!
- If your guest is not a Lion, or is a Lion with considerable distance to travel, offer him the opportunity to leave following the presentation.

INTRODUCING GUEST SPEAKERS

When planning an introduction, use the T..l..S formula in organizing your ideas.

is for TOPIC. Speak first about the topic of the guest speaker or the position of the guest speaker in Lionism. Give the exact title of the talk, if known to you.

is for IMPORTANCE. Next tell the audience why this topic or person is important to this particular group.

is for SPEAKER. Finally give the audience your speaker's qualifications. As the final two or three words of your introduction, give the speaker's name. Be sure to say it clearly and distinctly.

- Be brief. It is not necessary to speak longer than sixty seconds preferably less.
- Speak **informally** just as you would across a dinner table.
- Be enthusiastic about your assignment. Be alive. Make your introduction sparkle. You owe it to the person you are introducing and to your audience to put a lot of zip into your introduction. Show that it is a real privilege to introduce this speaker.
- Avoid inside jokes and reminiscing. This is not fair to the speaker or the audience. If you and the speaker have experiences from the pastleave them there.
- Above all, be warm and sincere. It is discourteous to be otherwise!

THANKING GUEST SPEAKERS

- The speaker should be thanked by a Lion Member who has been notified well in advance and not by a last minute choice.
- The thank you should be brief. A highlight of the presentation may be mentioned, but there is no reason to repeat most of the speech!
- A warm and sincere thank you with a formal presentation of a gift, certificate or donation, if planned, should be carried out by the thanker.

MOTIONS, AMENDMENTS, VOTING

MOTIONS: A motion is a proposal that the Club take certain action, or that it express itself as holding a certain view. The motion is made by a member obtaining the floor and saying "I move that", then stating the action he/she proposes the Club to take. The motion must be seconded. The reason for seconding a motion is to prevent time being consumed in considering a question that only one member may favor. If possible, motions should be in writing and duly signed by the mover and seconder.

When a motion is made and seconded, it is the duty of the Chair, unless he/she rules the motion out of order, to immediately state the question, or have the Secretary re-read the motion if necessary. When the Chair states the question, he/she is advising the exact action that is before the Club for its consideration.

After the question has been stated by the Chair, it is then before the Club for debate. In the debate, each member has the right to speak twice on the same question, but cannot make a second speech on the question as long as any member who has not spoken desires the floor. Speakers must address their remarks to the Chair and not to the members of the Club. (This tries to avoid any direct person-to-person conflicts.) The Chair has the right to rule any speaker out of order if he/she does not address comments to the motion on the floor.

AMENDMENTS: A motion can be amended but in order to amend a motion it must be related to the subject to be amended. The amendment must be moved and seconded.

The amendment can be amended, this is called a sub-amendment, and it too must be duly moved and seconded and relative to the original motion or the amendment. This sub-amendment is also known as an amendment of the second degree. Any further amendments (or amendment to the third degree) would be too complicated and are out of order. If an amendment is turned down in the vote it is in order to accept further amendments to the motion, or to amend an amendment.

VOTING: In the case where a motion on the floor has been amended, with an amendment to the amendment, the first vote is on the amendment to the amendment (amendment of the second degree). If it is defeated, and there are no further amendments, the next vote is one the amended motion. Should it be defeated, the final vote is on the motion itself. If the vote on the amendment of the amendment is in the affirmative, there would, of course, not be any further voting.

Protocol Be A Pro With Protocol

There really should be a better word than protocol. The dictionary definition is couched in terms pertaining to military, international agreements, diplomatic arrangements and dealings between countries and heads of state.

Not many of our members are involved with this kind of planning. Very few Lions will attend functions with ambassadors and kings. Even fewer will be involved with making diplomatic arrangements at those kinds of functions. However, every club president, district officer, many chairmen and Lion members will, at some time or other, be involved with protocol as it applies to Lions Clubs International.

Perhaps the meaning of protocol for Lions should simply translate to worlds like 'courtesy' or 'consideration'. As most Lions are polite and knowledgeable about etiquette, why is it that frequent examples of poor taste and lack of protocol occur at many Lions functions?

There is no specific answer to this, but often there may be a lack of communication, a lack of planning, or a lack of understanding about the customs, habits, like and dislikes of our fellow Lions and guests.

Communications

After the initial arrangements have been made to obtain your special guests for a Lions function, the chairman should write and give all the details. Spell it out. Don't use vague terms. No such word as informal should ever be used. Use definite descriptions - business suit, sport coat and slacks, long dress, short evening dress, black tie and jacket, white formal dinner jacket. Give as much detail about your function as possible and let the guests know exactly what is expected of them.

Greeting Your Guests

The Immediate Past President, or another Past President should greet the guests as soon as they walk in the door and they should be escorted and introduced to others gathered in the room. Guests should at no time be left alone. If other guests are seated and the guest of honour arrives before the start of proceedings, he/she should be escorted to their seat at the head table.

The Head Table

Seating arrangements at the head table often appear to be a challenge. The guest of honor always is seated to the right of the President. The remaining seats are designated according to the importance or position in the chain of authority. Always use place cards to avoid confusion as to who sits where.

The Flag, Anthem and Prayer

Protocol requires the proper positioning of our National Flag when it is flown with flags of other countries, provinces or organizations. It should be noted that our National Flag should be given the place of honor at all times. That place is always on the left as you are facing it with the exception of being placed in the middle when three flags are being flown. Should you be hosting an International guest it is always in order to display the flag of their country as long as ours is given the place of honor. It is also in good taste to play the guests National Anthem if available.

It is suggested that the Lions invocation or the Grace be utilized by all Clubs to ensure that no guest is made to feel uneasy about the use of a prayer which is from a different religious persuasion. The Lions invocation and Lions Grace are non-denominational.

The Meal

Lions Clubs are finding it increasingly difficult to offer deluxe food at functions due to prohibitive costs. Consequently, many functions are held in church halls, community centers, etc. Occasionally, paper or plastic ware is used. Whatever the menu, your guests should be served the same food in the same manner as everyone else. However, if your guests have dietary restrictions, religious or otherwise, it is essential that the committee provide for that situation.

These are the basic facts concerning dietary restrictions about which all Lions should be familiar. Guests also have a responsibility to make their restrictions known. Once the restrictions have been communicated, it is the club's responsibility to arrange for the fruit plate, the fish or vegetarian dinner, ahead of time. Never wait until the function begins to make these arrangements.

Introduction

The honor of introducing your guest speaker is usually given to the highest, ranking member in attendance, not necessarily the Chairman or Master of Ceremonies. There are reasons for this. Involving the highest, ranking member is a way of providing a reason for the visit. The introducer may have a personal relationship with the guest. He may have served with him or traveled with him. His knowledge may lend some color and human interest to what otherwise might be a dull or canned type of introduction.

Solicitations and Fines

The head table may be considered fair game, but don't approach your guests directly. If they want to participate, they will make their intentions known.

Appreciation

There are many ways to show appreciation to your special guest. The best way is to thank them. Every speaker is a performer of sorts and the attention given them after their presentation is their reward. It isn't necessary for the entire gathering to overwhelm them at the head table, but those who particularly enjoyed the presentation, as well as the committee and key members, should take the time to make a few comments and say thanks. Other means of saying "Thanks", may be used, such as charitable donations, certificates, gifts, etc.

Where Do The Flags Go?

The way it usually happens is that 15 minutes before the big event is due to start, someone, in a big panic, will rush up and say, "Which flag goes where?"

You really ought to know the answer, because there is International Protocol involved and you would not want, for instance, to have placed the flags in the wrong position.

So hereunder are some rules you can follow for displaying the flags of Canada, and <u>remember that any reference to left</u> <u>and right are taken from the spectators' point of view, facing the Head Table:</u>

PLACE OF HONOR:

In an array of flags, the Place of Honor is **ALWAYS**

In the centre if there are three flags displayed and

On the left if there are any number of flags, other than three.

THE FIRST RULE IS:

The Canadian Flag always goes in the Place of Honor. This is invariable and this position in not yielded for so-called courtesy or any other reason.

GENERAL ORDER OF DISPLAY:

Having placed the Canadian flag in the place of honor, the other flags should be displayed in the following sequence:

National flags
Provincial flags
Organizational (i.e. Lions) flags

Club Boundaries

Each Lions Club has a geographic boundary within which it operates with regard to fund-raising. From time to time a club may wish to embark on a project, which in order to be successful, requires a larger target group/area than their own territory offers.

If your club wishes to raise funds outside of your boundary, it is required, according to our Constitution, that permission be obtained from the club in whose area you will be fund-raising. The request and permission should be in writing.

Usually most requests for fund-raising outside of a Club's boundaries will be permitted; however, if a Club refuses a request, the Club asking for permission should accept the decision of the Club from which they are asking cooperation.

Borrowing of Club Paraphernalia

Although the "borrowing" of Club paraphernalia by visiting Lions can add to healthy inter-cllub rivalry and can build lasting friendships, it can also cause friction when inappropriate items are removed.

The practice of "borrowing" is neither endorsed, nor discouraged; however, if it is to take place, we strive to have this activity benefit fellowship, not cause rifts.

The following guidelines are intended to form the basis for an understanding of what is "appropriate" and what is "off limits" when considering "borrowing" items belonging to another Club.



Visitation Contest

Two awards are available:

- For clubs of 24 or fewer members as of July 1, 2005
- For clubs of 25 or more members as of July 1, 2005
- To receive credit for a visit, at least the following numbers must attend the meeting of another club:
- Two (2) members for the clubs of 24 or fewer members, or three (3) members for clubs of 25 or more members
- Members of the A-15 Leadership Team making official visits will not count as one of the two (or three) required members

"Borrowing" of Club paraphernalia:

- Must be restricted to the Club gavel or gong or other small item not vital to the Club's operation
- Other property removal, without the Club's permission, will disqualify a reported visit
- The Club must be informed as soon as possible after the "borrowing" about how and where to retrieve their property
- No credit will be given for:
 - more than one club being visited by the same club members on the same night, or
 - for a second visit to the same club
- Contest runs from Sept. 1, 2005 to February 28, 2006.

To qualify, the visit must be reported on the Activities Report of the visiting club and include the names of those attending the visitation

Points Awarded

For a visit within your Region	10 pts
For a visit in A-15 but outside of your Region	20 pts
For a visit outside of A-15	50 pts
The District Governor's club is not eligible.	

Bulletin Contest

District Contest rules are similar to those for the Multiple District, and are as follows:

Format:

Only five (5) points are allotted to the format so that all Clubs, regardless of dollars spent, will be judged equally. Twenty-five (25) points are allocated for the General Appearance of the Bulletin.

NOTE: Plagiarism will be subject to a deduction of 10 points UNLESS credit is given to the author or publication it came from, or "Author Unknown".

Life Membership

Any member of a Club who has maintained Active membership as a Lion for 20 or more years and has rendered outstanding service to his/her Club, his/her community, or the International Association of Lions Clubs; or any member who is critically ill; or any member of a Club who has maintained such active membership for 15 or more years and is at least 70 years of age may be granted Life Membership in his/her Club upon:

- (a) recommendation of his/her Club to the Association,
- (b) payment to the Association of US\$500.00, or its equivalent in the respective national currency, by his/her Club in lieu of all future dues to the Association, and
- (c) approval by the International Board of Directors. Nothing herein shall prevent his/her Club from charging a Life Member such dues as it shall deem proper.

A Life Member shall have all privileges of active membership so long as he/she fulfills all obligations thereof

A Life Member who desires to relocate and receives an invitation to join another Lions Club shall automatically become a Life Member of said Club.

What is a Melvin Jones Fellowship?

The Melvin Jones Fellowship is **recognition of a commitment to humanitarian work**. (It is not an award in the tradition of Lions awards presented for specific accomplishments.) The fellowship is an honor given to individuals **who contribute the equivalent of US\$1,000 to LCIF**, and persons for whom such donations are made by others. The fellowship is the foundation's highest honor and represents humanitarian qualities such as generosity, compassion, and concern for the less fortunate.

Melvin Jones Fellows receive a lapel pin and a personalized wall plaque in honor of their commitment to helping others.

When did the fellowship originate?

Created in 1973, the fellowship is named for the founder of Lions Clubs International. Melvin Jones.

Is the fellowship for Lions only?

The fellowship is not limited to Lions clubs members. It is open to non-Lions to whom identical recognition is presented.

May the fellowship be presented posthumously?

Yes, the fellowship may be given in memory of a deceased individual. In those cases, the plaque is inscribed, "in memory of" and is presented to the individual named by the donor to receive them. (Often the plaque, pin and letter are presented to a close relative of the deceased.) When filling out the application, please provide all of the information requested for the person to whom the recognition will be presented (the family member). That information is required to prepare an appropriate letter for presentation with the plaque.

Who can contribute toward a Melvin Jones Fellowship?

Contributions can be made by individuals including non-Lions, clubs, or districts in one sum, or in installments of a minimum of US\$100 over a five-year period, but only individuals can receive fellowship recognition. Is it possible to make a donation and choose the MJF recipient later?

Yes. You must tell us that the donation is to be applied toward an unnamed fellowship at the time it is sent in. Complete the yellow Melvin Jones Fellowship application (<u>LCIF-42</u>) or the application on the Melvin Jones Fellowship brochure (<u>LCIF-24</u>) available in .PDF format. Write "Melvin Jones Fellow to be named later" on cheque or bank draft.

When an individual's or group of individuals' personal donation(s) are accumulated for a club's use to select a Melvin Jones Fellowship recipient, we require documentation of the consent of the original donor(s) in writing, signed by each individual. When a club's donation(s) are accumulated for a fellowship recipient to be selected by the district, LCIF requires signed documentation of the consent of the club. Please include such documentation with the completed MJF application that is sent to LCIF Donor & Financial Services.






Lions Foundation of Canada Fellowship Award

Not-for-profit groups such as senior's homes, hospitals, schools and other special interest groups are encouraged to rent the Centre during May, June and September.

The Lake Joseph Centre gives visually impaired, blind and deafblind people the chance to experience things they've never experienced before and embrace life in a way they never thought possible.

The Camp accommodates up to 90 children in each of four two-week sessions in July and August. Last year a total of 360 children experienced a summer adventure of fun, activities, new skills and health care at Camp Huronda. Unfortunately we had to turn away more than fifty children due to space limitations.

Why do Children Attend the Camp?

The Camp helps children share similar experiences with others, creates good habits and builds self-esteem. It is a camp that many children learn how to give themselves insulin injections for the first time as well as learn various injection sites and develop effective blood monitoring skills. Through various camp experiences, children learn how to manage their diabetes successfully, which contributes greatly to delaying and lowering the risks of complications.

How is the Camp Funded?

Camp Huronda operations are dependent upon the support of foundations, service clubs, corporate and private donations.

Why was this program developed?

The "Guardian of Camp Huronda" project was developed by the Lions at the request of the District A-12 Diabetes and Camp Huronda Chair and approved by MD "A" in order to help raise much needed dollars towards the Camp's ongoing requirement of \$50,000.00 annually for refurbishment and capital projects.
