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**CABINET REPORTS**

**DG – Kevin Banfield**

In my travels around the district I have been hearing and seeing many great things happening. Thank you to everyone who is sharing these accomplishments on social media - we have a lot to be proud of!

However, I am still unfortunately hearing about an old and persistent issue, which is “How do we get others to step up and lead?”

Although we’d like to think that Lions learn most of what they need know during our formal volunteer training, in reality, most of what we learn, we learn by doing when we’re working on a project, from each other’s experience, knowledge, and ideas.

The goal of mentoring is effective knowledge transfer and the cultivation of volunteer talent. Through mentoring, experienced Lions get a chance to share their unique knowledge and experience directly with new recruits, and pass on the legacy of what they’ve learned.

New Lions, whether for specific or all tasks, should be matched with a fellow Lion, who shares their expertise, wisdom, and skills with them. They should be matched with a mentor once they have completed at least their volunteer orientation. Not all of their training needs to be completed if it is a complex project - in fact, mentors may help their mentees learn better during this. Both mentors and mentees ought to be oriented to the expectations of their respective roles.

Mentors and mentees should work together until the mentee has successfully completed their training or when they have demonstrated they can perform their work comfortably on their own.

As a district this year we are bringing to the clubs some different ways to support our membership. We had our first of four Tech Town “hands on” training sessions. These sessions can help Lions become accustomed to the newer communication tools, such as the use of social media, that have become so prevalent. It was great to see all the Lions that came out to this program, and I look forward to the other upcoming training days.

One other program which will be led by PDG Denis Vinette is a district-wide induction. At this event we will not only induct new members, but educate our New (and Current) Members about this great organization that they have joined.

### **Long Range Planning Report – PDG Thom Herrmann**

Long Range Planning is currently examining a number of areas of concern as directed by DG Kevin. At this time, we make the following recommendations to Cabinet regarding New Club Supplies.

**The Committee recommends the revision of existing Articles 17 and 18 of the A15 Policy Manual – Revised June 2018 as printed below:**

#### ***17 Costs Paid from the New Club Assessment Fund (2003 06 08)***

*Organizational costs relative to the formation of new Lions, Lioness, LEO or Branch Clubs to include, but not limited to, room rental and light refreshments in an amount not to exceed \$250 shall be reimbursable through the New Club Assessment fund.*





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*Regalia costs covered by the Fund shall include Lions Felt Banner, Large Gong and Gavel, Fine Bank, International Flag Set, Base and Engraved Plate, two Aluminum Flag Poles, Stand and Emblem Tops, Canadian Flag Set, Lions Clubs Flag Set, Club Member Printed Badges, Framing and Calligraphy for Club Charter and New Member Certificates.*

*Where an article of regalia is donated by a Club or individual, payment of the value of the article, as determined by the Cabinet Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer) shall be made to the newly chartered Lions Club.*

**18 Regalia for New Branch Clubs (2003 06 08)**

*Newly formed Branch Clubs shall, at the time of formation, be provided with a Lions Felt Banner plus Aluminum Flag Pole and Stand with the cost charged to the New Club Assessment Fund.*

**Be amended and consolidated into a single Article as follows.**

**17 Club Organizational and Regalia Costs Paid from the New Club Assessment Fund (2018 10 29)**

17.1 Organizational costs relative to the formation of new Lions, Lioness, LEO or Branch Clubs to include, but not limited to, room rental and light refreshments in an amount not to exceed \$1000 shall be reimbursable through the New Club Assessment fund except as noted in 17.4.

17.2 Newly formed Branch Clubs shall, at the time of formation, be provided with a Lions Felt Banner plus Aluminum Flag Pole and Stand with the cost charged to the New Club Assessment Fund except as noted in 17.4.

17.3 At the time of charter, regalia costs covered by the New Club Assessment Fund shall include Lions Felt Banner, Large Gong and Gavel, Fine Bank, International Flag Set, Base and Engraved Plate, two Aluminum Flag Poles, Stand and Emblem Tops, Canadian Flag Set, Lions Clubs Flag Set, Club Member Printed Badges, Framing and Calligraphy for Club Charter and New Member Certificates except as noted in 17.4.

17.4 Where regalia requirements and organizational costs are different from those listed above, e.g. Cyber Clubs, reimbursement shall be at the determination of the District Cabinet.

17.5 Where an article of regalia is donated by a Club or individual, payment of the value of the article, as determined by the Cabinet Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer) shall be made from the New Club Assessment Fund to the newly chartered Lions Club.
