
On March 27th 2013, Milverton Lions pledged \$15,000.00 to the Knollcrest Lodge "Raise The Roof" fundraising campaign.

BLANKETS TO ARGUS HOUSE FROM THE CAMBRIDGE HIGHLANDS LIONS CLUB



On March 5, Lions Marg and Pat visited Argus House for Girls in Cambridge. We were greeted with warmth and gratitude for what our club does for the shelter. A brief tour was enjoyed through the main downstairs area. The staff is very friendly and dedicated to the youth.

We delivered 10 blankets that our club makes as one of our annual service projects.
Squares are knitted by members and friends and sewn together to make beautiful colorful blankets. We also donated 10 blankets last year to Argus

House for the boys. There are 10 beds at each location, and the blankets are offered to the youth when they leave the shelter. As well as blankets, our club makes a monetary donation at Christmas to each of these shelters. This is used towards their Christmas Dinners or to buy personal gifts for the residents there at this time. These gifts are very much appreciated and help bring happiness for these less fortunate youth.

Argus Residence for Young People provides emergency shelter to youth, between the ages of 16-24, experiencing homelessness, in the community. There is a shelter for boys and one for girls in a separate section of Cambridge. Their addresses are not published to protect their privacy.

In addition to food, shelter and 24-hour staff support, Argus offers a voluntary life-skills acquisition program the goal of which is to mobilize young people experiencing homelessness toward healthy and viable community integration. Argus will accept youth in crisis from anywhere surrounding the Waterloo Region on a 24 hour basis.

Our goal is to accept a maximum of 24 youth from around the world and with your assistance we will achieve that goal.

We require your financial assistance in order to operate the program, we require your physical assistance on the weekend of May 24th and 25th to help with spring clean-up. If you are able to make it on Friday evening and wish to stay over for Saturday we need to know this in advance, arrangements need to be made with Five Oaks. Please R.S.V.P. approximate numbers to pccdrumble@yahoo.ca Please note the date change for the clean-up. At convention it was announced as the 18th and 19th and these dates needed to be changed. There is a lot to accomplish, bring your rakes, shovels, chain saws, gloves and enthusiasm. If there is anyone who can work with aluminum eves trough it would be appreciated. We need to put a small amount over the main entrance door and the kitchen door. We also need to find shingle experts in order to re-roof the Hermitage House and a portion of the dinning centre. If you know of anyone please contact us or simply make arrangements with them to be there on the 25th of May.

We need host Lions Clubs and we need host Families. Some have already committed to be a part of the program however we still need several more. We also need your support with the supplying of meals for the camp program. Some clubs have volunteered already however we still need lots more help. Meals are booked on a first come first served basis.
