

Dues Credits for Membership Drops Club Secretaries Please Take Note

Beginning June 30, 2018, dues credits for membership drops will not be issued after the release of the semi-annual billings on July 1 and January 1. Board Policy prohibits LCI from issuing membership dues credits, and the International Board of Directors recently decided that enforcement of existing policy is necessary in order to be in compliance with Board Policy. Here's how you can help your clubs prepare:

Remind club leaders to update their club rosters online using MyLCI or their regional reporting system.

Encourage club leaders to submit their membership rosters to LCI prior to June 30, 2018.

Inform current and future club leaders that membership dues credits will no longer be issued.

MORE NEWS ABOUT REPORTING IN MYLION.

Dear Lion Leaders and Officers,

We received feedback from district and club officers about their challenges with the July 1, 2018 launch of MyLion as the new service activities reporting system. And we listened. We understand that clubs and districts need more time to prepare for this important transition. By giving clubs and districts the option to report through MyLion for web or through MyLCI in fiscal year 2018-19, we can:

Provide more time for training our club and district officers

Give officers at all levels more time to communicate with their members and clubs to ensure a successful transition to MyLion

Ensure that club and district officers have the time they need to test MyLion so they can use it with confidence

We are still planning to release MyLion for web on July 1, 2018. We encourage everyone who is ready to use MyLion web to begin using it next year, but MyLCI can still be used for service activity reporting throughout the coming year. We will be combining service activity reports for both systems so that reports will be accurate no matter which platform you or your Lions are using.

Innovations like the new MyLion for web reporting system are important to the present and future of Lions. It also takes time, training and communication to make sure innovative technologies like MyLion work most effectively for our clubs and districts.

To better support you, we will send out more information including FAQs and training schedules in the coming days. We look forward to working with you over the coming year to prepare all clubs and districts for a successful transition to MyLion for web in fiscal year 2019-2020.

Thank you for your continued support and leadership in making your districts and clubs the top destinations for service-minded men and women around the world.





A-15 LIONS RECYCLE FOR SIGHT

In the past, people repaired, rebuilt and reused almost anything that could be; today recycling is a routine part of our lives, but more in the way of tossing items into the appropriate bin to be picked by the city truck. However, Lions Clubs in District A-15 have been recycling used eye glasses for decades.

In 1970, the Bridgeport Lions spearheaded a project called Glasses for India. With help of other groups such as the local Mennonite churches, fire stations, and the UW School of Optometry, 3,500 pairs of glasses were collected and sent to Lions Clubs in India.

In the early 1980s, the St Marys Lions gathered eyeglasses and old suitcases for missions to the Caribbean and Latin America. In 1984, a Hamilton optician Barbara Skinner, who went with a team to Ecuador, said that "10,029 patients went through the eye clinic; in total 7,500 pairs of glasses were fitted, but you need much more than you dispense." This speaks to the challenge of matching the available glasses to the needed prescriptions.

In 1988, the Guelph Royal City Lions twinned with the Lions Club of Negombo in Sri Lanka. In addition to much needed hospital equipment, the Royal City Lions shipped hundreds of pairs of glasses, which were used in eye clinics set up in poor villages in Sri Lanka.

The Guelph Royal City Lions today still collect, sort, pack and ship thousands of pairs of used eyeglasses annually.


For several years in the early 2000's, Lions from A-15, accompanied the medical teams on missions to Guatemala. Among these volunteers were Stratford Lion Royden Brien, Guelph Royal City Lion Stephen Jones, and Kitchener Lion Charlie Davis. They went into some of the poorest areas such as the Peten Rainforest, populated by 500,000 people of Mayan and Spanish descent.

Due to the many dialects, double translation was often needed, from English to Spanish to local dialect, and reverse. Lion Stephen Jones developed a computer program to keep track of the sorted eye glass prescriptions in their packing cases.

Others, such as St. Jacobs Lion Bill Runke, also travelled with the teams to help build schools as part of the Missionary Ventures Canada project.

District A-15 also supplied a YAG lazer, for the eye hospital in Guatemala. The cost was \$20,000 USF, which was purchased with matching funds from an LCIF International Assistance Grant. The opening of Vincent Pescatore Eye Hospital, San Benito, el Peten, in April 2004, was the culmination of several years work in Guatemala.

Many of the Lions Clubs in A-15 since then have been collecting used eyeglasses on a continuing basis. This April, at the District A-15 Convention held in Guelph, Clubs were invited to bring their used eyeglasses to the convention for a special service project, sorting eyeglasses. The Royal City Lions organized and supervised the eyeglass sorting event. The group of Lions who participated, including our International guests, ID Tom and Lion Gillian Gordon, had a fun time, sorting and visiting with each other, while Lions Bob Keleher and Bill Hocken sealed and labelled the boxes for shipment to the Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center, Montreal via Home Hardware transport from the H St. Jacobs warehouse.

On April 14th, the Lions of District A-15 sorted 6, 061 pairs of eyeglasses in one afternoon!





Millions of people in other parts of the world have no or little chance of receiving the eye care they need. By donating our old eyeglasses and sunglasses, we can help improve someone's vision and change their life. This is truly a hands on way to recycle and help others in need in developing countries. Well done Lions!
