


Monkton Lions give kids summer camp adventure

Revised Bulletin Contest Rules, Judging approved

Submission Deadline: Feb. 28th of the Current Lions Year

For Awarding: Annual District A-15 Convention of the Current Lions Year

Rules:

- 1. Submit, along with the Official Entry Form available on the District Web Site, your best example of a Bulletin published between March 1st of the previous Lions Year and Feb 28th of the current Lions Year.
- 2. You must have published a minimum of six (6) times in the qualifying period.
- 3. Submission may be in electronic (preferred) or printed format.
- 4. For submission by email, the subject line should note Club name and state "Official Bulletin Contest Entry". Submissions by ordinary mail should also note on the envelope "Official Bulletin Contest Entry".
- 5. A single winner will be named along with two honourable mentions.
- 6. A four member Judging Panel will be established by the current District Bulletin Editor and will consist of the current Bulletin Editor, the District Governor and two additional Lions who are not members of clubs who have submitted entries.
- 7. Entrants are free to enter contests in other jurisdictions or run by other agencies as determined by the entry requirements stipulated by those other jurisdictions or agencies.

Judging:

- 1. The District Bulletin Editor will distribute copies of each entry, along with the grading form (available on the District Web Site) to each member of the Judging Panel.
- 2. The grading form will list each evaluation criterion, Judges will rank each submission on each evaluation criterion, i.e. all evaluation is comparative rather than absolute.
- 3. Each submission's overall score will be the sum of the evaluation criterion rankings.
- 4. Each member of the Judging Panel will then rank each submission based upon the overall score and submit their results to the District Bulletin Editor.
- 5. Determination of the single winner and the honourable mentions will be based upon the average rankings submitted by the members of the Judging Panel.

Tree Planting Success

Innerkip and Hickson Lions clubs planted an additional 125 silver, red and sugar maple trees in the township of East Zorra Tavistock this year. These trees were planted as part of a tree planting campaign spearheaded by Lions International. The goal set by International President Tam at the 2011 Convention was to plant one million trees. Around the world, Lions have dug in and planted more than 15 million trees. The two Lions Clubs partnered with "Maple Leaves Forever" which funded 25% of the project. The two clubs blended resources for the remaining 75%. These trees were planted on the 15th and 13th lines between Oxford Roads 33 and 17.

Marking World Sight Day in Turkey

The focus of this year's **Lions** World Sight Day is on diabetic retinopathy and its relationship to blindness. Lions in Turkey will hold public eye screenings, focusing on diabetic eve disease detection, at the Bayrampasa Eye Care Hospital and in Idealtepe Eye Care Center. If diabetic retinopathy or other eye diseases are discovered, follow-up care will be provided.

Additionally, a press conference will be held on diabetic eye disease. Participating will include Turkish eye specialists, representatives of the Turkish Diabetes Association, Lions leadership and representatives from the World Health Organization.
