Guidelines for the Peace

The flyer (see inside pages) offer talking points for contactingh local schools and/or community groups.

1. The Theme for this year is "Our World.Our Future".

2. Kits are available until Oct.1 at a cost of \$10.95 U.S. plus Here's the gist of our tax. The toll free number is 1-800-710-7822. The order number is PPK-If there is money paid for a 1. Clubs must order a kit for each school or youth group they are sponsoring. This kit contains all the promotional materials needed.

> 3. Artwork must be no smaller than 33 cm by 50 cm and no larger than 50 cm by 60 cm.

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Poster Guidelines

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No writing or lettering on the front of the poster. All artwork must be the student's original creation. Do not fold the poster.

Suggestion: Bring two pieces of paper sized correctly to avoid posters from being disqualified.

4. Deadline Dates: Nov.15: Clubs to submit the winning posters, one for each sponsoring to the District Governor. Dec. 1: District Governors are to send the winning poster for their District to Council Chair. Dec.15:Council Chair will send the Multiple District winner's poster to Club Lions International. Feb.1: The International winners will be notified on or before this date.

5. Prizes:

a) The MDA winner receives \$1,000. The District Governor, along with the sponsoring Lions Club, will present this award in January or February.

b) The International winner receives \$2,500 U.S. and a trip to the United Nations for Lions Day in New York City, (subject to change) plus an engraved plaque. Two family members and the sponsoring Lions Club president will accompany the winner to the award ceremony, which usually takes place in March.

c) 23 Merit Award winners each receive \$500 U.S. and a certificate of achivement.

Poker laws can harm local clubs, individuals

(2011) section 15, of the Liquor Licensing Act, 'unlawful gambling', drunkenness and or disorderly conduct in any area on the premises is an offence.

Buy-backs an offence

Since some organizations are keeping the 'buy-backs' or 'top up' fees, this is a direct gain and an offence. Since some clubs make a profit on the refreshments, this is an indirect gain and this is an offence. The consequences are that the person whose name appears on a Liquor Licence or a Special Occasion Permit (if you are serving alcohol), the organization holding the event, and the hall or hotel or the premises where the event was held, may be reviewed by AGCO for infractions which may affect the status of current or future liquor licences or Special Occasion Permits

Licence available

Available to the public, is a Social Gaming Event Licence. Organizations that are not incorporated, are classed as having 'Charity' or 'Non-profit' status, and can apply for a Social Gaming Event Licence through their local municipality. There is a small fee. However, this frees them up to make a profit from the monies paid in, and the refreshments. Organizations that are incorporated may not qualify for a Social Gaming Event Licence, however, eligibility will be determined by the AGCO licensing office.

These officials emphasized that they were not interested in stopping us from having these events. Their intent was to inform us of the law and to encourage us to seek our own legal opinion before getting into these tournaments. They explained that organizers from 'for-profit' companies who arrange these events (equipment and rules, for a fee), will often portray the law as a 'grey' area. Obviously it is not a 'grey' area. When the law is broken, it is not these companies that suffer the consequences, it is the charitable organizations.

LAC Ted Bates BODY RECOVERED FROM 1940 CRASH Lion's uncle laid to rest with full military honours, Guelph club extends honours

Lion Larry Porter received surprising news recently. The bodies of Larry's Uncle, Theodore (Ted) Bates of the Royal Canadian Air Force, as well as Flt. Lt. Peter Campbell of the Royal Air Force were recovered more than 70 years after their plane crashed into Lake Muskoka.

They went missing on Dec. 13, 1940, when their Nomad 3521 collided mid-air with another aircraft. These two airmen have been laid to rest with military honours in

Guelph.

Peace Poster Contest

Through her involvement with District A-15 Lioness Janet has become involved with the Lions Club International Peace Poster Contest. Below is some information from the Lions Club International website about this great initiative.

An Annual Art Contest for Kids

Each year, Lions clubs around the world proudly sponsor the Lions International Peace Poster Contest in local schools and youth groups. This art contest for kids encourages young people worldwide to express their visions of peace. For 25 years, more than eight million children from nearly 100 countries have participated in the contest.

The theme of the 2013-14 Peace Poster Contest is "Our World, Our Future." Students, ages 11, 12 or 13 on November 15, are eligible to participate.

Promoting the Arts

Each year's art contest for kids consists of an original theme incorporating peace.Participants use a variety of mediums, including charcoal, crayon, pencil and paint, to express the theme. The works created are unique and express the young artists' life experiences and culture.

Spreading Peace and International Understanding

Twenty-four international Peace Poster entries are selected each year, representing the work of approximately 400,000 young participants worldwide. Posters are shared globally via the Internet, the media and exhibits around the world.

Peace Poster Contest Judging

Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme.


Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district and international. At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners. Peace Poster Contest Awards

International winners will be notified on or before February 1.

 One international grand prize winner will receive US\$5,000 and a trip to a special award ceremony with the sponsoring club president and two family members at Lions Day with the United Nations (subject to change).

Each of the 23 merit award winners will receive a cash award of US\$500 and a certificate of achievement.
