This committee was born out of the concerns of several Lions that under GMT there was no specific designation or program to investigate the reasons for Lions members leaving Lionism in our District.

A proposal for such a program was put together and presented to District Governor Lion Tim DeBlock. After deliberation and some changes the program was approved and in September a chairperson was put in place. The program was specifically designed for contact to be made by the chair with the Lion who had left his/her club and to confidentially fill out a questionnaire.

The information is strictly between the chairperson and the Lion with no name

or confidences being available to anyone else. The interviewee is given every opportunity to express any concerns or specific reasons why they left their Lions Club. An opportunity is presented by the chairperson to work out any difficulties so the Lion can return to his/her club, be transferred to another local or area club or if there is an interest in building a new Lions Club if there is an opportunity in the surrounding area. If the chairperson concludes there is a specific problem or problems with the club a report is to be made with no reference by name of the source of the information and given to the District Governor only for his/her information and followup if deemed necessary.

Prior to health issues of the chairperson there were some successes with 2 Lions accepting transfers to another club, 2 Lions returning to their club and 4 Lions willing to assist in the building of a new club.

With this program came some problems mainly the list of names of dropped Lions came all at once with only names and in some cases the club names. The program was changed to repair the deficiency and with the co-operation of club secretaries and if possible the membership chair, the information will be sent with the Lions name, club name, address and phone number.

Every Lion is invited to be a member and when this invitation is accepted the individual joins with a good reason and intentions. The reasons individuals end up leaving are numerous but mainly because of poor communication, personality conflicts, poor mentoring, closed thinking plus several others. This program gives those individuals the opportunity to express why this did not work for them and to tell some one what they did like and give them an opportunity to continue to serve and fulfill the reasons and good intentions they had when first they accepted the invitation to serve.

Make sure that for what ever reason a member leaves your club the District Membership Renewal Committee is given every opportunity for that exiting member to be heard and continue to serve as a Lion, for Lions if and where there is a better fit.






THAMESFORD LIONS – INAUGURAL RECYCLE DAY 2015

The Thamesford Lions initiated a scrap metal, vehicle batteries and end-of-use electronics recycling day in April. There was a steady flow of drop offs from 8amto closing. 13,000 lbs of electronics and 18,715 lbs of metal & batteries were diverted from the Oxford county landfill. The Electronics were packed and shipped under the Ontario Electronic Stewardship Program by our business partner, Green Valley Recycling, London. As a bonus,\$3895.00 was generated for local community projects. This will become an annual spring project for the club.

GIFT OF LIFE



District A15 has joined with MDA and the Trillium Gift of Life Network to provide awareness and to encourage residents in the communities we serve to consider registering to be organ donors. The Trillium Network tracks donation registrations by postal code and reports southern Ontario has a low response rate; the GTA, for example, has a registration rate of only 17 %. Compared with Northern Ontario where some small communities have registrations of 50 % or more. There is no question that organ

transplants save lives., on donor can save as many as eight people from the prospect of early death, a lifetime of blindness or kidney dialysis.

Ontario has a great need for organ donations. As of July 1st, 1,603 residents, friends, neighbors and family, were listed as requiring a transplant. Of the number, more than 1,100 of these need a kidney. One patient on the wait list in Ontario dies every three days.

Traditionally, organs have been donated by deceased persons, most often young people killed in traffic accidents. But in the past half century, improvements in automobile safety have changed the demographic. The supply of vital life-saving organs has dropped, because of a welcome decrease in fatal accidents. To offset this, the program has turned to live-donations which account today for nearly 40% of all transplants for organs where the loss of one organ does not impair the body's ability to function; and the use of what is termed, "marginal" organs. These are organs that in the normal course of treatment might otherwise have been discarded as not suitable because of age or minor medical concerns. They are still functional and provide an improvement for older patients that can be life-changing.

All clubs in A-15 are urged to support the recent approval by Cabinet to appoint the writer co-ordinator for the Gift of Life program and to create a web page to monitor the efforts by all Lions in the District and to encourage the clubs to appoint chairs from within.

All Lions are asked to consider embracing support of MDA and District A-15 Cabinet to join in the Gift of Life awareness program; to work with their friends, neighbors, family and supporters to get the word out about the need for organ donations. Clubs can consider holding an awareness event or combining the organ awareness program with an existing event. Whatever materials are required to hold these events can be provided.

Please inform me of the appointment of local club chairs so I can ensure Trillium and MDA provide the necessary support needed. The next person you make aware of the organ donation need, may just be the one person who provides a life-changing organ to a person within your community.
