its 100th anniversary in 2017

Is your club ready?

In honour of our organization's anniversary, clubs will want to work on projects marking this historic milestone.

Before selecting a project, ask yourself the following questions so you can focus on what best fits your club:

- 1.What would be a fitting project to celebrate Lions International's 100th anniversary? Brainstorm with club members.
- 2.What skills or contacts can we bring to the project? For example, is there an expert landscaper or carpenter in the group? Does someone in our club have a contact at city hall, etc?
- 3.What facilities or organizations (community center, shelter, park, homes, etc.) would benefit from hands-on service?
- 4.What signature (legacy) project would leave a lasting mark on the community?
- 5.What types of projects are our members passionate about?
- 6.Will we involve our sponsored / supported organization in the community?
- 7.Will we ask others outside the Lions family to participate?
8. Will our project attract media attention?
- 9.Will our project appropriately reflect 100 years of Lions service?
- 10.Will our project create pride in membership and in our Lions history?
- 11.Will our project attract new members to Lions?
- 12.How much time and how many people will be needed to accomplish our goals?
- 13.What is the estimated budget for our project, and how will we raise the funds?
- 14.Will our project capture our members' interest?

100 ways to Celebrate 100 years of Service
"We Serve"

1. Set up Lions Centennial displays at fairs, libraries, grocery stores, empty storefronts, etc.
2. Put articles in your local newspaper
(showcase your local Lions club history)
3. Use facebook/club bulletins to post old/new pictures (Lions at work /play) and include a short "we serve" story
4. Partner with other Lions clubs to celebrate "100 Years of Service"
5. Use local TV or radio
6. Support or hold a Community Centennial Celebration
7. Support or hold a District Centennial Celebration
8. Create and use a new display banner
9. Nominate someone for the Melvin Jones/ Helen Keller/ Lion Quest Award
10. Collect and display trivia and/or photos of Your Lions in action (events, etc.). Use in promotional articles and display at club meetings, and at club and district functions
11. Invite former members and dignitaries (Lions and community) to a club meeting
12. Write "thank you" notes to former members or supporters (can be combined with # 11)
13. Promote Lions Foundation of Canada (Dog Guide Program) and Lions Clubs International Foundation.
14. Publish history tidbits and fun facts in your local newspaper and Lions news
15. Have local officials (Council) proclaim
"Lions Centennial Day/Week/Month/2017"
16. Display Lions history at the community or school library
17. Have a Lions Centennial float in a parade.
18. Promote Melvin Jones/Lions Quest/Helen Keller in the community (What are they all about?)
19. Present at your local high school about community service and what we as Lions do. (WE SERVE)
20. Develop strategies to engage younger members
(Involve younger people in planning)
21. Collect stories of how Lions has made a difference to families, communities, etc.
22. Use the "Lions Centennial Logo "on all materials
23. Secure sponsors for centennial events
24. Collect and display historical Lions items from members and former members (Hats, Vests, Awards)
25. "Let them eat cake"...birthday cake that is!
Serve at meetings & events.
Make every meeting Special. Celebrate.
26. Plant a centennial garden. (Tree, path etc)
27. Host a centennial poster contest for kids (club, school, community, etc.)
28. Post a birthday countdown to build excitement to 2017

100. Create a “Lions Centennial” toolkit to assist in making this a memorial year.

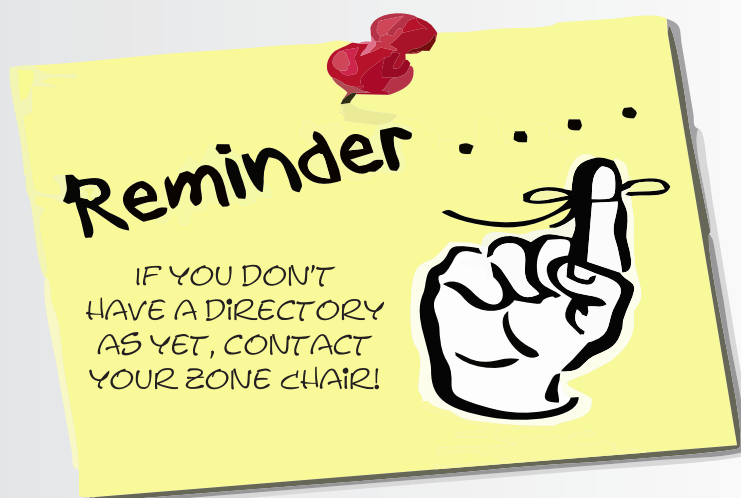

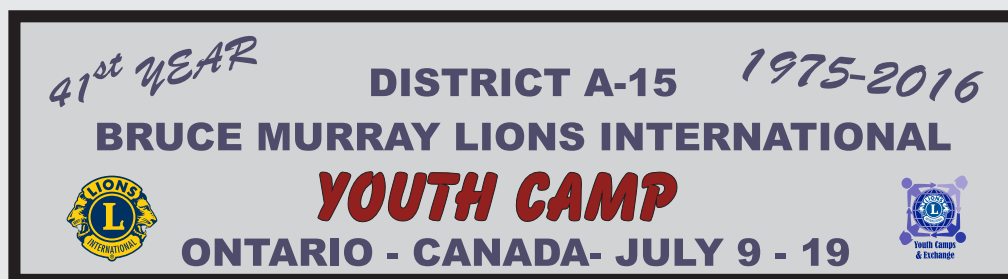

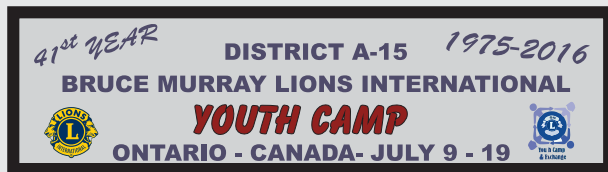
After camp, the Youth spent another four days with their host families before returning home on July 23. As mentioned it was a fantastic experience.
