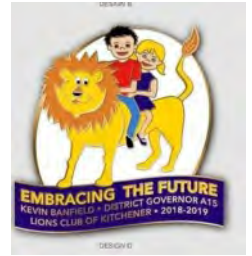

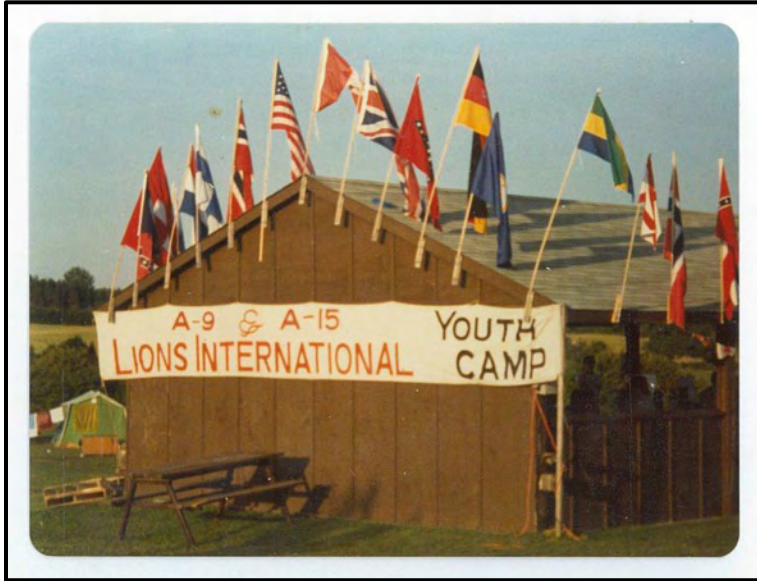

DISTRICT HISTORY PROJECT: BRUCE MURRAY INTERNATIONAL YOUTH CAMP

Past International Director Bruce Murray founded Canada's first International Youth Camp in 1975, and served for six years as its director. At that time, St Marys Lions Club was part of District A-9, and Lion Bruce Murray was District Governor (74-75).



The St Marys Lions hosted the first International Youth Camp at Wildwood Park, with 30 youth attending. The camp counsellors were Lion Royden Brien and his wife (Stratford), PDG Bill Moody and Kaye (Mount Forest); with help from Lion Dr. Jim Loucks, Grant Cookson and his wife Joyce (camp nurse).



Wildwood Conservation Area (on the outskirts of St Marys, about 8 miles from Stratford) was a camping area developed around a man-made lake. It boasted swimming, hiking, fishing, sailing and water skiing, along with a large dining shelter, clean washrooms and showers. As well as touring the St Marys and Stratford area, the campers also visited historic Goderich, Niagara Falls and Ontario Place.

District A-15 was formed in 1976, with Lion Dougald Campbell (Elmira Lions) as our first District Governor. That year, new tents and camping equipment were purchased to provide for the 1976 camp, which was jointly operated by Districts A-9 and A-15.

Originally the campers stayed in tents at Wildwood; then for two years they were housed in trailers.

From 1988 on, each District opted to hold their own separate youth exchange program.

In the late 80's, the Youth Camp was held at the Walter Tkaczuk All Star Hockey Camp, St Marys. There was a U-shaped building with one side for girls, the other for boys, and a dining hall in between; also a swimming pool.

Subsequently, the camp was relocated to Five Oaks, Paris. The Lions of A-15 each spring participated in a work weekend, grooming the grounds and buildings upkeep, earning credit hours against the user fees for the camp. In early 2016, the board of directors of Five Oaks decided to close the camp due to insufficient funds for needed renovations. In 2017 and 2018, the youth camp has been held at the Blue Springs Boy Scout Camp, near Acton.



Our District Youth Exchange program has evolved but still follows the original basic principles of the first exchange – to provide youth from other countries an opportunity to learn about Canadian customs and hospitality, see interesting parts of Ontario first-hand, and enjoy a time of recreation and fellowship together. The Lions of District A-15 continue to be supportive and can be very proud of our Youth Exchange Program.

LYNDEN LIONS HOST WORKERS AT BBQ

Each year our community is enhanced by the arrival of a large number of migrant workers from Mexico who come to work on the crops. On Saturday, August 25th the **Lynden Lions Club** hosted a barbeque for them. They enjoyed a feast of all Canadian hamburgers, hot dogs, corn and salad and we all had an opportunity to renew old friendships and make new ones. A great evening for everyone.

Please be aware that Google has done two things related to security lately:

- 1) forced the use of SSL/TLS (the little padlock in your browser address bar, in conjunction with use of "https", where the "s" stands for "secure")
- 2) Declared certain third part email clients as "not secure". Apple Mail is among those.

Both of these things can cause issues when attempting to access email. Please do not include password problems as an issue - those are entirely separate.

DISTRICT HISTORY PROJECT

GUELPH LIONS TELEPHONE DEVICES FOR THE DEAF

Beginning in 1981 and 1982, the Guelph Lions Club under Project Chairman Lion Rick Bishop, purchased 20 Minicom IV telephone devices for deaf, valued at \$300 each from the Canadian Hearing Society, and donated them to deaf people in the community. These devices linked people to the regular telecommunication network, and deaf people now were able to contact emergency and other services by phone.

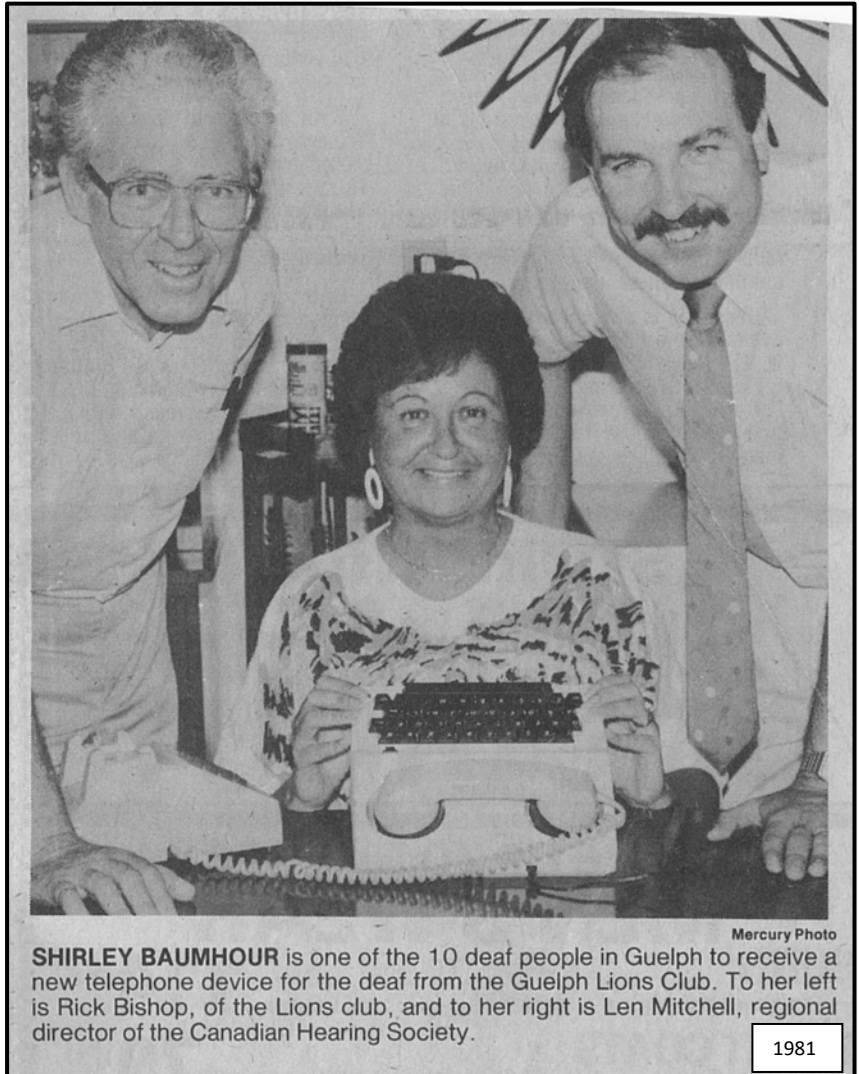
These lightweight and portable units replaced the older teletype machines, which were railway models that had been converted for phone use. The old machines which were still in use, weighed 50 pounds and had a keyboard like a manual typewriter; also replacement parts were no longer available.

These new devices could make calls only to other telephone devices for the deaf. The Guelph Lions also provided new Superprint 200 telephone devices with printers to the two hospitals and the city police.

These units provided a permanent printed record of each conversation.

The Canadian Hearing Society had a directory listing of who could receive deaf telephone calls. In August, 1981, Bell Canada expanded its 24-hour, toll-free, message relay service for the deaf to include those people in the 519 area code. At that time, this special service was already in use in the 416, 613, and 514 area codes. With the message relay system, deaf people were given the same freedom as hearing people for use of the phone.

By 1988, the Guelph Lions had completed their project to supply all Guelph area residents with speech and hearing impairments severe enough to prevent them using a regular telephone, with Telephone Devices for the Deaf (TDD). The completion of this project made Guelph one of the leading cities in the province in providing communications access for the challenged.

SECRETARY'S REPORT TO CABINET

In order to assist with the timing of the District Directory for next year, I would ask Club Secretaries to go through their records and change the way the data is presented to be the same. Some have ALL CAPS, some are “proper” in that they have the first letter of the person’s name/address, and city be capitalized the remainder in lower case. In this day and age, All CAPS is considered “shouting”, and we certainly do not want to do that. Some clubs have a lot of members, so correcting a bit at a time would be a good idea.

We are working on the Directories at probably the worst time of the year with people on holidays etc. Still, we need to have updated and accurate data if the Directories are to be useful. It is a lot of work and I would like to thank Garry Ransom for doing the work this year as he has in the past.

TREASURER'S REPORT TO CABINET

The financial and banking records have been passed over to Lion Louise Howe to take over the role of Cabinet Treasurer. I am presenting the final financial statements as at June 30, 2018 to close off the last Lions year. The financial statements in the package have been reconciled to the statements for bank accounts and all GIC investments as at June 30. The financial statements fairly reflect the financial position of the District. The informal audit of the financial statements will be completed in the near future with a report to the District Governor / Cabinet to follow.

ADMIN – for clarification, I add the following:



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- The Balance sheet for the District ADMIN accounts includes the Bank account balance of \$8,335.52 is net of any outstanding cheques for expenses etc. to close off the year-end.
- Investments include \$24,000 (2.20% to June, 2019) for the reserve, \$7,886.48 (1.80% to June, 2019) of surplus held parked in a GIC to earn some interest – these total \$31,886.48. As well, there is \$6,000 from the International Director account invested at 1.50% to January, 2019 to earn some interest on those funds.
- We ended the year with a surplus of \$6,322.73 for the 2017-18 year. Our revenue was very closely aligned to the budget (\$266 below budget). For expenses, there are 2 areas above budget: i) awards \$660 includes a higher number 100% President, Secretary, Membership awards to Clubs and ii) Cabinet Expense by \$220 which is mainly meal costs for Cabinet & Committee Chairs. Several areas are noted where the budgeted amount was used sparingly or not at all (Centennial Project, Leadership Institutes, and USA/Canada Forum).
- Also note that expenses for the Global Action Team at \$644 is after recovery of approx. \$1,200 from Lions International. There may still be some recovery from MDA as well.

From the surplus, I am recommending some funds be retained as follows:

- o \$1,500 be moved to augment the 'New Club Assessment Fund' – in order to support Club development.
- o \$1,500 be set aside in the Centennial Project - to be used at the direction of Cabinet for either our District Centennial Project and/or any future purpose related to Centennial celebrations for Lions in Canada in 2020 (this matches the amount set aside in 2017).
- With the remainder, **I am proposing a rebate of dues to the Clubs in the amount of \$2.00** per member based on the # members invoiced in September, 2017. This rebate will be netted off the invoice for 2018-19 and will amount to approximately \$2,906. The balance of the surplus will be retained in ADMIN.

TRUST – balance sheet is straight forward and reflects balances for applicable District & Lion project accounts. I have provided some Committee Chairs with info on their respective project. If there are any new Committee chairs that need some history on activity etc. for your committee, please connect with CT Lion Louise. Of note in the bank accounts:

- Lions Quest is high and includes the LCIF Grant received in amount of \$12,900 to be used this fall. - Trust includes the \$17K+ held for the Centennial project to be paid out when the project work is completed
- Effective Speaking is quite low and 'owes' the Youth Camp account \$1,500 for the transfer made to cover unusually high expenses in the spring of 2017.

GICs held here include:

- Vision Screening \$5,293.76 at 0.35% to July, 2018 (renewed for 1 year at 2.00%); Youth Camp Capital \$7,845.49 at 1.50% to Feb, 2019; Lions Quest \$7,725.36 0.45% flexible; Youth Camp regular \$13,186.76 at 2.20% to Jun 2019.

I am available to answer any questions. And, will require a motion from Cabinet to accept the Treasurer's report with financial statements as presented.

Committee Chairs might wish to take advantage of the opportunity to become more familiar with the District's Email system.

Tentative plans for the November Workshop are coverage and promotion of the benefits, the design, construction and maintenance of integrated web site and social media platforms and the precautions that all users should employ to protect their privacy. Specifics of the remaining sessions will be released as we receive suggestions as to needed or desired sessions and firm up our plans for them.

We would like develop a pool of Lion volunteers around the District willing to serve as the "go to" people for assistance with tech issues. It is hoped that your technical questions will be resolved via a phone call, email or perhaps even a "house call" if needed. If you or someone you know has capability in this area please contact me to discuss your possible involvement. Support training would be made available.

Clubs have been advised to delay moving their monthly service reporting from the familiar MyLCI interface to the new MyLion Desktop until such time as the roll out has been thoroughly explored and we are able to provide adequate training and support.

Filings of the District Global Leadership Development Plan as well as applications for District Operating Budget and District Program Development Reimbursement Funds have been completed and will be submitted to LCI as soon as they activate their submission platform.

In order to recognize those Lions who have participated in significant Lions Learning opportunities and to encourage others to do so, we are proposing the introduction of a District A-15 Learning Recognition Award, motions which will be introduced under "New Business".

Tech Town – VDG2 George Corrin

Welcome back to another year of Lions. As each club prepares budgets and plans service activities, with their new club executives learning their new roles. "This can be a daunting task". The District has people to assist each member to accomplish their individual goals as well as club goals. I too am starting my journey to learn many new tasks to fulfill my responsibilities as VDG2. Campaign 100 – Dr. Jack Bishop

Corporation, Foundation & Government Gifts Committee

At the Lions International Convention in Las Vegas last July a new fundraising campaign was announced to commemorate our 100th Anniversary. This will be called "Campaign 100 LCIF Empowering Service" and its goal worldwide is to raise \$300 million (US) over the next 3 years.

PIP Dr. J. Yamada is the Chairperson and PIP Frank Moores III is Vice-Chair. There is our normal organizational set-up for fundraising as in the past that will involve Members, Clubs, Districts, Multiple Districts, Countries, and the 7 Constitutional Areas, Canada is constitutional Area II.

For the first time LCIF has set up 2 Special Committees that report directly to the Campaign Chair, Dr. Yamada. The first is the Lead & Major Gifts Committee that will be soliciting gifts from \$25,000 up to \$1Million US. At our first meeting in May in Chicago Dr. Yamada asked 3 of his friends who were PID to come forward. They presented their million dollar cheques to get the campaign started.

I have been asked to sit on the Corporate, Foundation and Government Gifts Committee to represent all of Canada. My job is to get money from companies, foundations and the Federal & Provincial Governments. This is a job for "who you know not what you know".

I am asking you and your Lions to come forward if you have any friends or relatives that are Corporate Executives or have connections to any government, either to politicians or civil servants. For example, at the Winnipeg Meeting – a PDG from PEI, who is a member Parkwood Central Lions. The Minister of Health for PEI is also a member of the club. We will make a presentation along with staff from LCI in Chicago. If successful this Minister knows all the other Health Ministers in each Provincial Government and he can introduce us. - That's how this program has to work to catch those "Big Fish".

Just to make you aware, the 5 major areas of emphasis in the Campaign are:

1. Diabetes
2. Environment
3. Hunger
4. Childhood Cancer
5. Vision

All I am asking for is if you or any Lion has contact with someone involved at a high level in a company foundation or government that might help us in any of those areas that I just mentioned for the campaign to give me a call and see if we can set up a meeting.

I understand that Peter Osborne has been made Coordinator for the District A15 for Campaign 100 and he will be talking to you after he completes his training.
