out from shore by a rip tide. Not having the desired rescue equipment, the couple called for family friends and beach goers to join hands to form a human chain to bring the stranded swimmers back to safety. At one time over forty people joined the chain.

This was not without cost. One 68 year old suffered a heart attack during the rescue ordeal but is expected to make a full recovery.

When interviewed, the young man said "That's just how we were brought up; you lend a hand to anyone in need if you can"


BRIDGEPORT, KW COMMUNITY SPIRIT & ST. JACOBS LIONS

"We really appreciate what VON Sakura House provides to the community and we also appreciate what the Wellington Animal Hospital does in donating their time and resources in helping injured animals to bringing them to a point where they can be adopted by a family."
