REPORT TO CABINET FROM CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE

Governor Gary and members of Cabinet;

In conjunction with the recommendations of Long Range Planning to Cabinet at this meeting, several changes to the A-15 bylaws to streamline our document and to keep this document in synchronization with the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws (SDCBL) from Lions International (which document supersedes A-15's document) are required. Might I first suggest that Cabinet direct that the SDCBL be added to the list in 'Publications' on the A-15 website.

ITEM ONE

Wording to bring our definition of members of cabinet in line with SDCBL is required and is 'Resolution 1' herein.

Resolved that Article 1 Section 1 of the A-15 bylaws be amended after the words "global service team district coordinator" by adding the words: "district global extension team coordinator, district marketing chairperson, global extension team coordinator," and by replacing the words: "shall be non-voting" with "may be".

Resolved that in 'Article III Meetings, item 3 Quorum and Vote', that the word 'Constitution' be deleted and replaced with the word 'Bylaws'.

ITEM TWO

Year after year our bylaw has had to be amended to reflect changes to the duties of various cabinet members and this year is no exception. Rather than continue this seemingly yearly process the following changes to the A-15 Bylaw are recommended:

Resolved that Article V Section 1 be deleted and replaced with the following wording: **DISTRICT GOVERNOR**. Under the general supervision of the International Board of Directors, they shall represent the association in their district. In addition, they shall be the chief administrative officer in their district and shall have direct supervision over the first and second vice district governor, region chairpersons, the zone chairpersons, the cabinet secretary-treasurer and such other cabinet members as may be provided for in this district constitution and by-laws. Their specific responsibilities shall be those found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Clubs International (as amended from time to time).

Resolved that Article V Section 2 be deleted and replaced with the following wording: **FIRST VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR**. The first vice district governor, subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor, shall be the chief administrative assistant and representative of the district governor. Their specific responsibilities shall be, but not limited to, those found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Club International (as amended from time to time)

Resolved that Article V Section 3 be deleted and replaced with the following wording: **SECOND VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR**. The second vice district governor, subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor. Their specific responsibilities shall be, but not limited to, those found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Club International (as amended from time to time).

Resolved that Article V Section 4 be deleted and replaced with the following wording: **CABINET SECRETARY-TREASURER**. (or Cabinet Secretary and Cabinet Treasurer if the position is split) They shall act under the supervision of the district governor. Their specific responsibilities shall be those found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Club International (as amended from time to time).

Resolved that Article V Section 5 be deleted and replaced with the following wording: **GLOBAL SERVICE TEAM (GST) DISTRICT COORDINATOR**. Under the supervision of the district governor, the GST district coordinator is a member of the District Global Action Team. Their responsibilities include those found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Club International (as amended from time to time).

Resolved that Article V Section 6 be deleted and replaced with the following wording: **GLOBAL MEMBERSHIP TEAM (GMT) DISTRICT COORDINATOR.** Under the supervision of the district governor, the GMT district coordinator is a member of the District Global Action Team. Their responsibilities include those found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Club International (as amended from time to time).

Resolved that Article V Section 7 be deleted and replaced with the following wording: **GLOBAL LEADERSHIP TEAM (GLT) DISTRICT COORDINATOR.** Under the supervision of the district governor, the GLT district coordinator is a member of the District Global Action Team. Their responsibilities include those found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Club International (as amended from time to time).

Resolved that Article V Section 8 be deleted and replaced with the following wording: **LCIF DISTRICT COORDINATOR.** Under the supervision of the district governor, the LCIF coordinator is a member of the District Global Action Team. Their responsibilities include those found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Club International (as amended from time to time).

Resolved that Article V Section 9 be deleted and replaced with Article V Section 11: **REGION CHAIRPERSON** (if the position is utilized during the district governor's term). The region chairperson subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor, shall be the chief administrative officer in their region. Their specific responsibilities should be found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Club International (as amended from time to time).

Resolved that Article V Section 10 be deleted and replaced with Article V Section 12: **ZONE CHAIRPERSON** (if the position is utilized during the district governor's term). The zone chairperson subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor, shall be the chief administrative officer in their region. Their specific responsibilities should be found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Club International (as amended from time to time).

Resolved that Article V Section 9 be deleted and replaced with the following wording: **DISTRICT MARKETING CHAIRPERSON.** Under the supervision of the district governor, the District Marketing Chairperson is a member of the District Global Action Team. Their responsibilities include those found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Club International (as amended from time to time).

Resolved that Article V Section 10 be deleted and replaced with the following wording: **GLOBAL EXTENSION TEAM COORDINATOR.** Under the supervision of the district governor, the Global Extension Team Coordinator is a member of the District Global Action Team. Their responsibilities include those found in the Standard District Constitution and Bylaws of Lions Club International (as amended from time to time).

Resolved that the present Article V Section 11 Sergeant-at-arms be renumbered as Section 13

ITEM THREE

Cabinet should discuss (with input from the nominations and elections chairs) adjusting Convention Policy with regard to candidate nomination/seconding etc. at the convention to bring policy in line with current procedure.

Please note – the numbering system in current policy manual needs correction.

I ask that cabinet move to send the resolutions in items one and two above to the next A-15 convention for a vote by the voting delegates.

BACKGROUND

From LCI Standard District Constitution and Bylaws (SDCBL) [as recently amended]

Article VI Section 2. **DISTRICT CABINET**. The district shall have a district cabinet composed of the district governor, the immediate past district governor, the first and second vice district governors, the region chairpersons (if the position is utilized during the district governor's term), the zone chairpersons, a cabinet secretary-treasurer or a cabinet secretary and a cabinet treasurer, and such other club members as may be included in this section as amended in accordance with the amendment procedures contained herein. In addition, the district global membership team coordinator, district global leadership team coordinator, global service team coordinator, district global extension team coordinator, district marketing chairperson and LCIF district coordinator shall be non-voting may be members of the district cabinet. Each such cabinet member shall be a member in good standing of a Lions club in good standing in the district. In the event a Leo or Leo-Lion is appointed to the position of Leo/Leo-Lion cabinet liaison, the position would serve as a non-voting advisor to the cabinet.

Current A-15 Bylaw

Article I Section 1 - DISTRICT CABINET

The district shall have a district cabinet composed of the district governor, the immediate past district governor, the first and second vice district governors, the region chairpersons (if the position is utilized during the district governor's term), the zone chairpersons, a cabinet secretary-treasurer or a cabinet secretary and a cabinet treasurer, and such other club members as may be included in this section as amended in accordance with the amendment procedures contained herein. In addition, the global membership team district coordinator, global leadership team district coordinator, global service team district coordinator and LCIF district coordinator shall be non-voting members of the district cabinet. Each such cabinet member shall be a member in good standing of a Lions club in good standing in the district.

Article III Meetings 3 Quorum and Vote

The attendance of a majority of the officers of this District shall constitute a quorum for any cabinet meeting. The voting privilege shall be extended to the voting member of the district cabinet as defined in Article 1, Section 1 of the District A-15 Constitution.

The other chairs as described in the SDCBL need to be added to our Article 1 Section 1 As well in Article III Section 1 Quorum and Vote, the word 'Constitution' needs to be changed to 'ByLaw'

ITEM TWO

Changing the wording of the duties of various cabinet members to make reference to the SDCBL will save having to vote on amendments to our Bylaw anytime there is a change in any of these. At the same time, we can add the additional chair -DISTRICT MARKETING CHAIRPERSON

ITEM THREE

Recognition of Candidates for Office

This is a policy change which cabinet can make at any cabinet meeting: In the Standard Schedule of Events as part of the Convention Policy Manual, I believe there needs to be a change to reflect the actual activities (i.e.: Do we have (need) Nomination and Seconding of candidates for Gov., 1st and 2nd Vice after the report of the elections chair? Do we have rules for demonstrations or even are they allowed?

Election and Credentials

We will not be changing to a computer/electronic credentialing for this convention. I have not been able to get things organized in time for this cabinet meeting so we will continue the old way one more time.

I will be available to answer any questions at the Cabinet Meeting.

Leadership - Experience - Opportunity

Sponsoring a Leo Club allows Lions to mentor and empower young leaders while fostering a commitment to community service. Through involvement with a Leo club, Lions can energize and inspire members and increase the sponsoring club's community exposure, attracting potential members such as young professionals, students, parents, and families. If your Lions Club wants to sponsor a Leo Club there are six steps in organizing one.

Step 1: Establish a Framework

Will the new Leo Club be community or school-based, Alpha (ages 12-18) or Omega (ages 18-30)?

Step 2: Identify Potential Leos

Obtain the names of potential Leos from various sources in your community, friends, and relatives.

Step 3: Invite Prospective Leos to an Informational Meeting

Explain the philosophy of the Leo Club Program and answer questions concerning requirements for Leo Club membership, the relationship to the sponsoring Lions Club and Leo service activities.

Step 4: Host a Formation Meeting

Organize a Leo Club formation meeting to elect Leo Club officers, discuss potential projects, and determine the place and time for club meetings.

Step 5: Complete Required Paperwork

Complete an organizational report with proper signatures. Attach a list with the names of the club's founding members and forward it to the Leo Club Program Department. The entire certification process can take four to six weeks.

Step 6: Plan an Installation Ceremony

Once the Leo Club Organization Report form has been approved, the sponsoring Lions Club should launch the Leo Club with an installation ceremony, presenting the Certificate of Organization and installing Leo Club officers.

Leo Club Organization Fee

The Leo Club organization fee is US\$100 or the national currency equivalent. This one-time fee

includes:

- The costs involved in processing the Leo Club Organization Report
- A Certificate of Organization
- A Leo Club officers' kit
- A Leo Club sponsor kit

• Leo lapel pins for each original Leo club member

Leo Club Sponsor Levy

Lions clubs are also billed an annual Leo Club sponsor levy of US\$100 or the national currency equivalent. The levy pays for Leo Club Program materials, mailings, club record maintenance, communications, awards and program resources.



Region of Waterloo (ROW) Pilot Program Year 1 – 2022/2023 Vision Screening Program

The ROW screening program was a collaborative effort between the Lions Clubs, Cowan Foundation, local school boards, Region of Waterloo Public Health (ROWPH), and the University of Waterloo School of Optometry and Vision Science (UWOVS). Funding of this program was through donations from The Cowan Foundation and The Lions Club International Foundation.

Six vision screening teams were developed to accomplish the ROW program. Five teams were comprised of Lions members, community volunteers, and COWAN Foundation staff. One team was comprised of UWOVS students. Vision screening was completed between November 2022 through to April 2023.

Within the Region of Waterloo a total of 4,809 senior kindergarten (SK) were screened resulting in a referral rate of 54 percent (2,606). Largest number of referrals were from the refractor station.

Region of Waterloo Pilot Program Year 2 – 2023/2024 Vision Screening Program

In October 2023 vision screening within the ROW resumed following the same structure and protocols as the 2022/2023 season. A brief refresher training session was conducted in early October for volunteers, with school screening commencing mid October.

Again there are six vision screening teams conducting weekly screening events. The program should be completed in April 2024 and concludes the Two Year Pilot Program.

As of January 2024 over 4,000 senior kindergarten children have been screened under this program.

Huron Perth Public Health Unit (HPPHU) – The HPPHU and UWOVS have completed initial planning for a Spring screening program across the HPPHU. Over 40 schools will have screening completed. All Lions Clubs within this area (12 clubs) been contacted about developing screening teams. To date Milverton Lions have indicated that they will create a team for this effort. Two more vision teams are required (6 persons each team) to complete this program. The HPPHU and UWOVS will establish the screening procedures and train the Lions members in advance of project kick off.

Wellington Dufferin Guelph Region (WDGR) – The Fergus Lions have contacted the Vision Chair regarding vision screening in the WDGR. The Fergus Lions have a refractor and screening equipment and manpower to conduct screening in this area. The Wellington Dufferin Guelph Public Health Unit (WDGPHU) was contacted and they indicated that no screening will be undertaken in early 2024 but may resume in the fall of 2024. The Fergus Lions may undertake screening on their own or wait til the Fall and encourage the WDGPHU to move forward with screening activities. A decision on this will be made shortly.

Other -

Lions in District A-15 continue to collect used eyeglasses and submit these for refurbishing and reuse to the Calgary collection center, or the Montreal collection center.

A refractor, vision kit, and a hearing testing unit have been picked up from the Milverton Lions Club. These units have not been in use since 2019. The refractor has been handed over to the UWOVS staff for a software update and maintenance.

The Ontario Blind Golf (OBG) has requested Lions support for their blind golfers and the programs underway in Ontario. Information regarding this request has been forwarded to the A15 Lions clubs and posted on the Sight Conservation and Screening webpage.

The Lake Joesph Mini Bus campaign has fallen way short of its fund raising goal (\$80k). The funds currently raised are around \$6800. The fund raising information for this campaign has been resent to the A15 Lions Clubs for consideration again.
