As mentioned in the previous Cabinet Report, I am still identifying and collecting information specifically in the area of enabling Clubs to enhance their support for members with a disability. The ultimate goal is to enhance services through the increased participation in Club activities by all Members. I would like to thank Lion Cheryl Bauman [ZC-51W] who shared the Accessibility report that she prepared on behalf of the Late, PDG George Corran, in his former capacity of District Accessibility Chair.

Clubs will be provided with the identification and practical approaches to accommodating the physical accessibility and comfort to meeting facilities for members with mobility issues such as those who use walkers or wheelchairs.

There are relatively straight forward considerations to ensure that those of us who wear hearing aids can fully participate such as the use of a sound system for larger meeting venues.

Clubs will be provided with guidelines for access to print materials such as font size, colour contrast and photos and images circulated electronically for those who are blind and low vision. Appropriate materials and training will be provided.

Diabetes Chair Report to Cabinet

DG Bill and Members of Cabinet,

The clubs of District A-15 have been busy promoting Diabetes Awareness in their communities.

- K-W Community Spirit Lions On October 3rd sponsored a Refreshment Station for \$1000 at the "Lace Up to End Diabetes" Walk held in Waterloo Park. One of their members participated in the walk and \$175 was pledged on the team page. In total \$11,595 was raised including sponsors. K-W Community Spirit Lions Evelyn and Jack Fisher also held a Diabetes Awareness event on October 7th at the Clair Hills Retirement Residence in Waterloo. Sixteen people received Diabetes Awareness brochures and a blue carnation. \$65 was raised for Diabetes Canada.
- Belwood Lions held their annual Toll Bridge on September 22nd to raise funds for Diabetes Canada. They reported that they did quite well with the event.
- Dundas Lions Club held a Diabetes Fundraiser Golf Tournament where \$2000 was donated to Diabetes Canada.
- Stratford Lions Club will be holding a Diabetes Tag Day on November 23rd.

As you all are aware, November is Diabetes Awareness Month and November 14th is World Diabetes Day. If your club hasn't done so, please consider donating to Diabetes Canada. You can tag your donation to go to research or to D-Camps like Camp Huronda or wherever funds are needed.

BEING GREEN IN A-15: The Environment Chairperson's Report for November 9th, 2024

The beautiful colours of fall are on display right now, and so is the Environmental Spirit of the A-15 Lions! Here's how the Lions of A-15 have been furthering environmental causes this year:

Environmental Cleanup and Restoration

The **Kitchener-Waterloo Community Spirit Lions Club** hosted a roadside cleanup service project on October 5th, picking up 12 bags of garbage from alongside Ebycrest Road in Woolwich Township. Six member of the club (and two volunteers) were also assisted by a member of the **Kitchener Lions Club**.

Two members of the **Freelton Lions Club** (and a Freelton volunteer) removed invasive phragmites from Silver Creek on October 6th to support the Silver Creek Restoration Project.

The **Freelton Lions Club** held a pilot for their Heavy Metal Buckthorn Pull service project on October 19th, removing an overflowing truckload of invasive common buckthorn from a re-naturalization site along the Eramosa River. Seven club members (and four volunteers) were joined by four members of the **Guelph Lions Club**, who provided invaluable support.

Tree Planting and Tree Care

Two members of the **Freelton Lions Club** (and a volunteer) participated in tree planting for Guelph's Take Root Program on September 29th, and again on October 5th.

The **Burford Lions Club** had a community tree-planting event in Burford on October 19th. They planted over 400 trees in the park and provided a free BBQ lunch to volunteers.

Recycling and Waste Management

The **St. Jacobs Lions Club** held a metal recycling fundraiser from July 1st to August 25th, where volunteers collected cans on a farm property. Their efforts raised \$200!

The **Kitchener Pioneer Lions Club** had an ewaste drop-off from September 28th-29th, where two volunteers received and sorted electronic waste from the community.

The Rockwood Lions Club (with help from the South Wellington Lions Club) held bottle drives in July and September, raising \$850 dollars by collecting bottles and cans from local neighbourhoods. The two clubs hold a combined bottle drive fundraiser every third Saturday of the month.

The Bellwood Lions Club (with help from the South Wellington Lions Club) collected bottles and cans as a fundraiser every second weekend between May 24 and Thanksgiving, raising ~\$2000.

A request was sent out to all clubs to participate in the MDA Environment Photo Contest, with the final date for submission being March 29th in order to allow for printing before the convention.

The bat box initiative is coming along and should be presented to the committee on November 9^{th} . All clubs are highly encouraged to participate, and will receive a personalized, engraved emblem to put on their box as thanks.

If there are any clubs who have environmental initiatives on the go or would like some help figuring out an environmental project to take on, I would love to hear from them!

Global Extension Team Coordinator November Cabinet Report

The GET Team and GMT coordinator conducted a 1day membership workshop on October 6th. I would like to thank DG Bill for allowing us to use his work facilities. The title of the workshop was *Unlocking Growth: Strategies to Expand Your Club Membership*.

There were 28 attendees not including the facilitators representing 22 clubs. The discussions centered around club planning, building a team, action plans, how to "just ask" and specialty/branch clubs. The day ended with a bonus topic on how to convert a service report to a news release using Al. A survey of the workshop was done and following is an Al summary of the survey results.

Workshop Feedback Summary: Membership Strategy Workshop

1. Learning New Membership Strategies:

Many new strategies: 35%

• A few new strategies: 53%

• No new strategies: 12%

2. Workshop Structure and Delivery:

• **Participation Mix:** Most attendees (76%) felt the balance between facilitator guidance and attendee participation was optimal.

• Desired More Participation: 18%

• Preferred Less Participation: 6%

3. Content Focus Areas:

- **Time on Club Planning:** 71% felt it was just right, though 24% wanted more focus.
- **Time on "Just Ask" Strategies:** Opinions varied, with 41% requesting more emphasis, 35% feeling it was sufficient, and 24% wanting less time.
- **Time on "Planning":** 56% felt the time was adequate, while 31% would have preferred additional focus.

4. Community Service Ideas:

Three or More New Ideas: 65%

• One or Two New Ideas: 24%

No New Ideas: 12%

5. Overall Workshop Satisfaction:

• Exceeded Expectations: 35%

• Met Expectations: 47%

• Did Not Meet Expectations: 18%

6. Practical Tools for Recruitment:

• Definitely Useful Tools: 53%

Somewhat Useful: 41%

• Not Really Useful: 6%

7. Likelihood of Strategy Implementation:

• Very Likely to Use Strategies: 41%

• Somewhat Likely: 47%

• Not Likely: 12%

8. New Ideas Learned:

 Techniques like making recruitment discussions member-centric, partnerships (e.g., United Way), leveraging social media, volunteer roles ("Friends of Lions"), and AI for marketing emerged as fresh strategies.

9. Desired Future Topics:

 Interests include mastering digital tools (MyLion, AI, Facebook), fundraising, community collaboration, mentoring, succession planning, and better access to a directory of available workshops.

Summary: The workshop was well-received, with participants valuing the balance of facilitator input and interactive elements. Attendees learned practical, actionable ideas for membership growth, with the majority expressing intentions to adopt these strategies.

The next membership workshop is on how branch and specialty clubs can enhance your club membership. It is a zoom workshop held on November 10th at 7:00 pm



Report to Cabinet November 2014

The vision statement of LCIF is to be a global leader in humanitarian service.

The Foundation does incredible work in Canada and throughout the World. Without the support of Lions Clubs, Lions and corporations the foundation would not be able to support all the requests that are needed.

Our District has received a matching grant of US\$75,000.00 to support the construction of the Guide Dog facility this year. We also received a grant of US\$50,000.00 in support of vision screening as well as the Elmira Lions Club receiving a community access grant last year.



Cabinet Meeting Report

Dog Guides Update

Work on the new school is making great progress. The foundation of the new school is poured and work has commenced on the first floor of the building. Construction is progressing on time with the completion of cement work anticipated to be in November.

Dog Guides have secured \$42 million towards the \$50 million Difference campaign to build the new national Dog Guide training school. Of this, Lions' clubs across Canada have contributed \$3.7 million! Thank you to the hundreds of Lions clubs across the country who are helping build the future of Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides. However, there is more to go to reach the goal. District A15 Support for Dog Guides

It costs \$35,000 to raise, train, and place a Dog Guide, which are provided to qualifying Canadians with medical and physical disabilities at no cost. With no government assistance, the foundation relies on fundraising events and donations from many sources including Lions Clubs.

There is still time to participate in the Dog Guide Puppy Calendar Lions program. Green Capes Lions Club offers a <u>calendar fundraising program</u> that helps clubs raise money for their community while supporting Dog Guides. This time of year, Lions Clubs are busy with local events and community craft shows, setting up booths to sell items to raise money for Dog Guides. Nomination Chair Report to Cabinet November 9, 2024

Nominations for District A15 office positions for the 2025/26 Lions year are now open as of November 1st for the offices of District Governor, 1st Vice District Governor, and 2nd Vice District Governor. Nominations for the offices of Zone Chairperson and Region Chairperson will be accepted now with campaigns starting January 1st.

Campaigning Guidelines:

- Formal campaigning for the offices of 1st and 2nd Vice District Governor and District Governor may commence as of November 1st.
- Formal campaigning for Zone Chairperson and Region Chairperson may commence on or after January 1st.
- No campaigning may commence without proper paperwork being filed and brought up under necessary business.

Nomination Forms:

The nomination forms can be accessed on the A15 website: <u>Nomination Form</u>. If you require a paper copy, please do not hesitate to contact me, and I will ensure it is provided to you.

Qualifications for Office:

The qualifications for each role are outlined below:

District Governor:

- 1. Active member in good standing of a chartered Lions Club within the district.
- 2. Secure endorsement from the candidate's club or a majority of the clubs in the district.
- 3. Currently serving as 1st Vice District Governor in the district.
- 4. In cases where the current 1st Vice District Governor does not stand for election, a club member meeting the qualifications of a 2nd Vice District Governor, with one year served as a member of the district cabinet, may be eligible.

1st Vice District Governor:

- 1. Active member in good standing of a chartered Lions Club within the district.
- 2. Secure endorsement from the candidate's club or a majority of the clubs in the district.
- 3. Currently serving as 2nd Vice District Governor in the district.

2nd Vice District Governor:

- 1. Active member in good standing of a chartered Lions Club within the district.
- 2. Secure endorsement from the candidate's club or a majority of the clubs in the district.
- 3. Previous service as a club president for a full term or major portion and as a board member for at least two additional years; also, prior service as a zone or region chairperson or cabinet secretary/treasurer for a full term.

Region Chairperson:

- 1. Active member in good standing of a chartered Lions Club within the region.
- 2. Secure endorsement from the candidate's club or a majority of the clubs in the region.
- 3. Previous service as a club president and board member or as a zone chairperson/cabinet secretary/treasurer.

Zone Chairperson:

- 1. Active member in good standing of a chartered Lions Club within the zone.
- 2. Secure endorsement from the candidate's club or a majority of the clubs in the zone.
- 3. Previous service as a club president and board member.

I am more than willing to visit any club or Lion who would like additional information about becoming a candidate and serving on the A15 District cabinet for the 2025/26 Lions year. This is an excellent opportunity to contribute to our Lions community and lead with dedication and service.
