ADDENDUM

1) District Governor's Opening Remarks

I would like to thank the Plattsville Lions club for hosting our meeting.

Wow, we are over half way through this Lions year. I want to thank our ZCs and RCs for there help. They are the heroes of our cabinet. Not only have they done club visits, organized zone meeting but they have also assisted the GAT chairs with their responsibilities.

We have accomplished so much!!

There have been 82 Lions International online courses taken. Everything from club officer training to public speaking to servant leadership. Last year only 4 courses during the same time frame.

Today we are -9 members in the district. Last year we were -23 members so we are making progress. Your GMT coordinator PDG Tracey and myself are confident that we will be plus by June 30th.

At this time our district has served 89,176 people. That is with 64% of our clubs reporting their service. At this rate and with 100% of our clubs reporting then we would have served almost 140,000 people. Could we serve 250,000 by year end? Thank you everyone for living up to our motto "We Serve".

DG Garry did a PowerPoint presentation comparing setting goals for a bike ride to a club setting goals and an action plan to add service projects.

2) Special Presentation – Rockwood Community Pantry

Lion Dawn Raynard & GST Chair Anita Ertel spoke on having a passion or idea and sharing it with others. Talking with the people you associate with each day, brings new ideas for service project, volunteers or possibly new members.

After they discussed that the growing number of working families struggling to afford basic living expenses has doubled since 2021, exceeding \$800,000 individuals visiting our food banks each month.

The idea to start a community pantry in Rockwood was embraced. Starting with some flyers around the area, a few boxes of food donated from our local grocery store. Five individuals were served the first week and this has grown each week. We moved into the saint Johns Anglican Church fellowship hall, free of charge, and are currently serving hot soup and rescued/donated food items to approximately 30 individuals each week.

We would like to encourage other clubs to begin their own pantries or food service projects and offered to be open for advice or assistance if needed.

3) POGO Fundraiser – Rockwood and District – Lion Dianna Hewitt

... imagine you're the parent of a young child with cancer facing Chemo, Radiation, surgery, or all three. In addition, you have the added expenses of travel to and from Sick Kids, or McMaster or Ottawa, parking, food at the hospital, childcare for other siblings, lost wages while one parent stays with the child.

And imagine the fear and worry that your sick child may not live to see 4, or 5, or 8, or 12 years of age because s/he has cancer. I'm sure each of us knows a family that lives from paycheque to paycheque, struggling to pay for rent, groceries, car payments, etc.

Suddenly, the family now has a sick child who needs weeks or months of extra medical care in a hospital a long way from home. And when or if s/he recovers, there will be a need to be monitored for years in case it comes back.

POGO (Pediatric Oncology Group of Ontario) offers medical, financial, and emotional support to families going through this devastating experience. The funds they raise offsets some of the financial expenses involved.

Once a child id diagnosed, POGO assigns a nurse to that family who stays with them until the child turns 18 years of age.

Did you know ...

POGO maintains a Province wide database of every child who has or has had cancer in Ontario. Oncologists, family doctors and researchers need constant access to the database. They do receive some government funding to maintain only the database.

The funds that <u>we</u> raise goes to support the families of children with cancer. Rockwood and District Lions is holding a Pyjamas and Pancakes Breakfast to raise monies for POGO. You can donate online by going to Pyjamas & Pancakes and searching Rockwood and District Lions.

Please consider a donation, no matter how small to support our event on Family Day, February 19th, and please consider hosting your own Pyjamas and Pancakes event. POGO will design and provide all the necessary advertising and help however they can. Lions provide the place and the pancakes, with the proceeds going to POGO. I know there are Lions Clubs with experience making pancakes. Thanks.
