

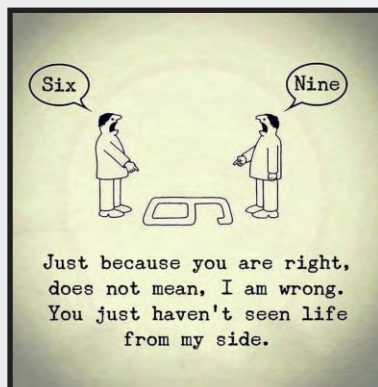

The 30th Conservation Dinner was a chance to continue to build a legacy for the future while looking back with pride on the success of the past three decades. 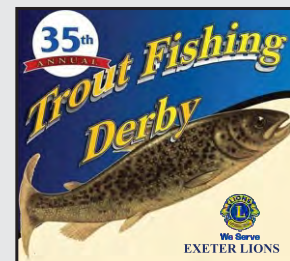

The following began with Lion Kevin Frost, a member of the Orleans Lions, he is a Deaf/Blind Speed Skater. A few years ago he was on a mission in Mexico to assist deaf children in getting hearing aids. Lias Ornelas was a young lad that benefitted from Lion Kevin's efforts in getting him the devices at a young age. As Lias got a little older they fitted him with a cochlear implant that was very beneficial.



As luck would have it Lias experienced had a bad fall and suffered head trauma head that changed everything with his hearing. The doctors have informed his family that he needed a new processor for the cochlear device. This will greatly improve Lias' situation, the down side is the cost. It is upwards of \$30,000.00 Canadian. A call has gone out to all Lions to support this request. District A4 has started the ball rolling with a \$1,500.00 donation.

Kevin Frost

Orleans Lion, Ontario, Canada

An elite speed skater, Kevin Frost, 48, races at speeds up to 32 miles per hour despite being almost completely blind and deaf. He credits his astounding success to having a positive attitude, training hard and helping others.



Kevin Frost is a three-time World Blind Champion in short track speed skating and ranks 13th in the world against able-bodied skaters. Lions have sponsored Frost in many competitions.

Compound Loss

I've worn hearing aids since I was 11 years old. When my night vision got bad when I was 27, I found out that I have Usher syndrome type 2, which causes hearing loss first and vision loss later. I currently have 9 percent of my hearing and 2.5 percent of my vision.

Hitting Rock Bottom

I had been a workaholic and was married with three kids. I lost my job and my driver's license. My marriage ended. I had refereed over 20,000 hockey games, and my dream was to be an NHL linesman. I had to give that up.

Finding Hope

I had to put my energy into something. The Canadian National Institute for the Blind gave me the tools to get back into society. I received my first miracle guide dog, Nemo. Then I tried skating.

Therapeutic Sport

When I'm speed skating, it feels like I'm driving again and I have my sight back. It's pure freedom.

Tenacity and Strategy

It's hard work. I've had a lot of falls. People ask how I do it. I count strides, learn the oval [rink], communicate with my coach

Created the nonprofit Visually Impaired Speed Skating Association to help the sport become a Paralympics event

Has conducted hearing aid missions to Mexico for 15 years

Has given more than 300 motivational talks around the world

through a wireless receiver on my hearing aid. I can't hear the starting gun so I feel for it. An orange flag is waved at the end for me.

More than Medals

I've won medals and set world records, but that's not why I do it. I'm working toward creating a movement for visually impaired skaters. It also enables me to help people—the young boy in Mexico who was transformed after helping him receive a hearing aid. The girl who overcame her embarrassment of using a white cane after I took her around town with our canes. And the girl who overcame her fear of dogs, thanks to Nemo.

Secret to Success

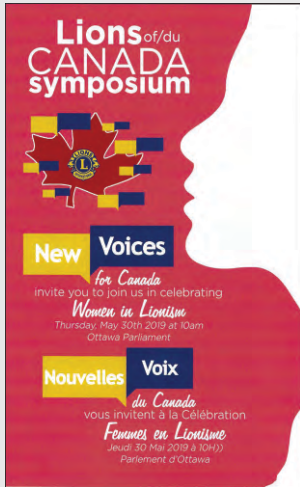
My childhood was tough. I was bullied and teased. When I speak to schools, I talk about turning a negative into a positive and succeeding no matter what. It's about karma: the more you give, the more that comes back to you.

The Waterloo Walk raised over \$29,000. Our thanks to all our sponsors, donors, and helpers to make this annual event a success once again.

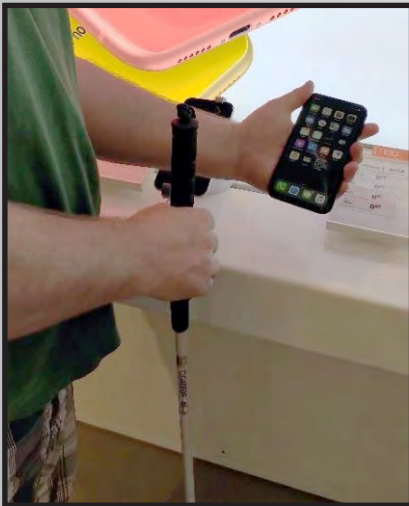

Guelph Lions Club Sponsor U of Guelph New Technology BlindSquare Program

Question: What Do a White Cane and an iPhone Have In Common?

Shane who is in his mid 40's became blind in 2005. He has limited sight but uses a cane to navigate. He also had an old android phone for communication and information. Shane decided to go to university where he is in his 3rd year taking physiology hoping to obtain a job in human resources. But how do you use a white cane to tell you the bus schedule, know where you are when you have lost your directions or find a class room at the University of Guelph. Thanks to an iPhone purchased by the Guelph Lions Club and a custom-made GPS app for blind travelers called Blindsquare, he can now do all those things. For the first time in history, using this app, navigating with a white cane has become safer and more efficient. This revolutionary application enables blind persons to navigate city streets, find an elevator in a large hotel, the door to a specific classroom or check out a restaurant's menu while sitting comfortably at home before deciding where to dine out. Opportunities for education, employment and community participation have been made easier and at times even possible thanks to applications such as Blindsquare.



The iPhone and apps such as Blindsquare rank among the great game-changers in the lives of blind persons, since the invention of Braille and sound recordings; and allow unprecedented access to information through digital technology. The Guelph Lions Club is excited to be part of this new and expanding opportunity for blind persons.

MD-A AWARDS NEW HAMBURG LIONESS

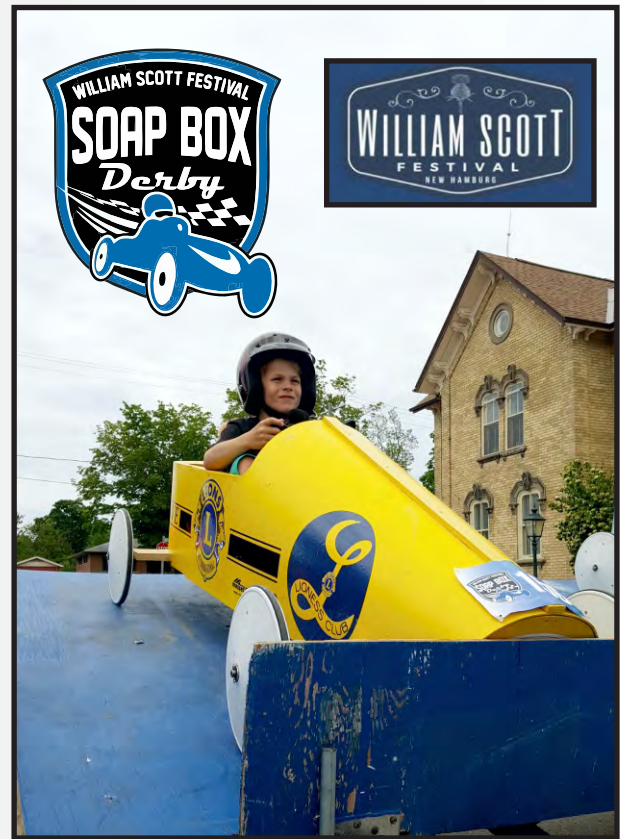

MELVIN JONES Founder of Lions International



•Lions Clubs International began as the dream of Chicago insurance executive Melvin Jones. He believed that local business clubs should expand their horizons from purely professional concerns to the betterment of their communities and the world at large

•Dr. W. P. Woods, of Evansville, Indiana, USA was elected as the first president. Guiding force and founder Jones was named acting secretary, thus beginning his relationship with Lions that ended only with his death at the age of 82 in 1961

•Just three years after its formation, the organization became international when the first club in Windsor, Ontario, Canada was established in 1920. Clubs were later organized in Mexico, China and Cuba. By 1927, membership stood at 60,000 in 1,183 clubs.

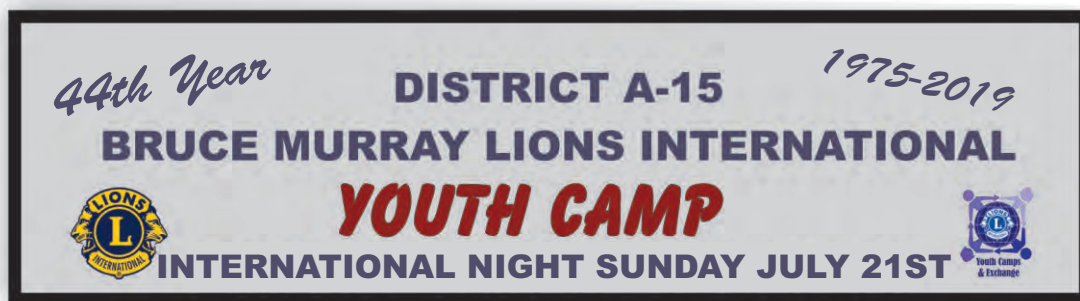
