





"Club GMA"

What the heck is "Club GMA" (Global Membership Approach)? Well, it is kind of like a watch my family gave me for my birthday. It tells me when the sun will rise or set, the outside temperature, what direction I am going in so I do not get lost, it tracks me so Nancy knows where I am if I do get lost, my heart rate, my blood oxygen level, how far I have walked or cycled, and many other activities I have not thought of. Or I can wear it and it tells me the time of day. What else do you need a watch for? Similarly,



some Lions want a watch that simply tells the time. In other words, continue with our longstanding service programs. The challenge some Clubs are facing is to continue to meet the service expectations with fewer members.

When clubs set out to grow membership, it can seem daunting, not unlike learning all the features on my watch simultaneously the club Global Membership Approach (GMA) that takes us through the process, ending up with a realistic plan to increase membership. At strategic points along the way, your Club will receive guidance and advice. The action plan is left to the development by the members of the club. This recognizes that each Club has unique needs and resources. When I asked my son-in- law the best way to learn all the features of my watch, he asked me what features are most important to me: the compass, oxygen level, heart beat, the distance travelled and so on. In other words, he helped me determine my highest initial priorities before trying to understand the entire instruction manual. The GMA process is quite similar. It's designed to enable Clubs to follow the process according to their needs and circumstances. Some Clubs have found it beneficial to seek the support of a District-trained facilitator whose responsibility is to ask questions and give some direction but it is up to the members to identify what is important to them, projects they consider priorities and others that are not apropriate.

Given the pace of change, it is necessary to stop and ask: "Do our current clubs meet needs and valued within the community? With this information, your ready to begin to determine where you want the club to be in 3-5 years. With these goals and objectives, you can turn to the development of the action plan. The above may sound complicated but in fact, GMA provides a step by step detailed process to follow.

We would respectfully disagree. Larry has been a dedicated supporter of Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides for decades. He and his wife, Hilda, have organized and participated in eight walks for the Pet Valu Walk for Dog Guides – helping raise an astounding \$70,000!

In 1976 Larry became legally blind. In 1977 he became charter member of the new Fergus Lions Club in Fergus, Ontario.

Larry remembers when the very first Canine Vision Dog

Guide graduated from the foundation in 1985.

Larry met his own Dog Guide, Otis, on the third day of training in Oakville.

"When Otis came, he laid his head in my lap and let me scratch his head and neck. I knew we were a match made in heaven – as I was the biggest, oldest and greyest client and Otis was the biggest, oldest and greyest dog. That bond has stayed with us ever since.

Otis always knows if I am not having a good day or not feeling well. He lays at my feet when I'm sitting, follows as I walk through the house, jumps up and lays beside me on the bed. All I do is move

and he is up for whatever I might need."

Larry is dedicated to raising awareness of the importance of supporting Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides. As Larry says, "to give the precious gift of a Dog Guide to clients in need anywhere in Canada."

In his words, "Thank you seems too little to say." But we would like to offer the biggest thank you to Larry, Hilda and Otis. For all their dedication to helping others, through their support of Dog Guides.

On August 17, 1961, CNIB Lake Joe, the only accessible camp of its kind in Canada, opened its doors to campers with sight loss for the very first time. CNIB is grateful to Lions – the Knights of the Blind – for helping CNIB secure this piece of paradise on Lake Joseph, and for tirelessly serving as valued volunteers, generous donors, and dedicated advocates.

As we celebrate warm memories of the past 60 years, we are building a bright future for generations to come! With the support of our dedicated Lions, we are smashing barriers to ensure that everyone who wants to attend CNIB Lake Joe can do so.

One of our most urgent capital needs is to replace our aging minibuses. We are seeking Lions' support to raise \$160,000 for a new minibus to provide reliable, safe, accessible and comfortable transportation for campers. Everyone impacted by sight loss – adults, children & youth, and families – should be able to access life-changing programs at CNIB Lake Joe. In the words of Lion Peter Best, "If they can't get there, they can't benefit."

One camper explains why CNIB Lake Joe is so important to her: "CNIB Lake Joe feels like home. It's the only place where I don't have to explain myself or my disability. Sadly, many people with sight loss miss out on transformative experiences at Lake Joe because they simply can't get to camp. But, as Knights of the Blind, Lions can change that!

"AS LONG AS I'M ABLE"

"I think it is important to give something to your community." That's a statement Leah Graves heard from her father that she's held on to for many years. Her father, Bill Roth isn't just talk, he puts in the work and hours in volunteering for his community in Wilmot Township. "Looking back, I can't think of a time when my father wasn't contributing in some capacity to various groups in the New Hamburg and area," Graves said.

He served as a volunteer firefighter for the Wilmot Fire Department for about twenty years, is the current president of the Wilmot Lions/Lioness Club, where he leads meetings on how the club can better serve the community and also volunteers with the New Hamburg Mennonite relief sale and Huron-Perth Christopher Leadership to name a few.

"I just think it's important for people to recognize that there are a lot of people in the community who are kind of like those silent heroes in a way, the quiet heroes that do a lot without expecting much in return," she said about her dad. Graves, who described her father as a family man, said he's been both her hockey coach and Sunday school teacher.

For Roth, he gets satisfaction from being involved in the community and holds the view that every member of the community has a responsibility to be active where they are. As the president of a service club, he said many people do not realize how much work is put into it because they're not involved. It was hard for him to highlight his achievements since he started volunteering in the 1980s but he said he's happy that together with his team, he was able to merge Wilmot Lions and Lioness club in July 2021 and the rest is the beginning of history.
