

#### "THE CAMPBELL"



The Lions District A-15 Gavel is named "The Campbell" in honor of our first District Governor, Lion Dougald Campbell (1976-1977), of the Lions Club of Elmira. At each annual District A-15 Convention, a ceremony of passing the Campbell is held; this in recognition of those Past District Governors who have served in District A-15, and also to acknowledge those

Governors who have served in other Districts and currently reside and serve in A-15.

At the convention opening ceremonies, the procession of "Passing The Campbell" begins with the District Governor passing it to the most recent Past District Governor, then successively in order to the most senior Past District Governor. At the completion of the ceremony, The Campbell is entrusted to the most senior Past District Governor, for keeping until the closing of convention.

The ceremony of passing the Campbell is repeated at the close of convention; at which time the gavel is passed back through the line from the most senior Past District Governor to the District Governor, who places it in the hands of the District Governor Elect to keep until the Convention of the following year. The Campbell is housed in a beautiful oak cabinet built and donated to A-15 by PDG John Brash and PDG Nancy Brash.



Editor's Note: I have not yet mastered the "FLICKR" sofware, as a result there are several duplicates in the album. I may become more competent when Pigs Fly!

As many of you know, I operated a UPS Store. We would have people who would bring in a return package with a shipping label on it, drop it on the counter and leave. We had the same question...how do we get these people to be customers with out asking them? We began to think, what would make the drop off customer leave having had a great experience? We came up with a number of small steps.

- Keep the store clean.
- Have dedicated staff who enjoy speaking with customers.
- Greet everyone within the first 3 steps into the store.
- Open the door, carry in their packages.
- Ask each customer how their day was going.
- Always wear your UPS Store promotional wear.
- Offer individually wrapped chocolates or cookies on special holidays. When they accepted a chocolate, they usually took a moment to have a brief conversation giving you time to learn more about them and their needs.

We increased our walk-in sales by 10% each year by never asking them to purchase. They would give the store their business just because of the small things we did and treating them like a friend.

Does this apply to Lions....you bet it does! When you are having a pancake breakfast, have someone **circulate** around the tables, greeting them and **ask if they are enjoying** the pancakes. If you have a future project, explain the project and **let them know that** you are looking for **volunteers** and leave a business card on the table. Be sure to let them know who is providing the pancakes.

The next time you are doing a fund-raising project or a service project, think about ways that you can engage the people that you are serving.

Many will get to know you, the person behind the Lion and begin to ask about the Club and what you do.

Always have a membership component to your project.


Membership is so important to all Lions Clubs. We need to keep adding members as our members are getting older.

# Conservation Dinner auction, held in person in 2023, raises more than \$50,000 for community

# Charitable fundraising auction was cancelled in 2020, held virtually in 2021 and 2022 and returns as live event in 2023

The Conservation Dinner, a charitable fundraising auction of the Exeter Lions Club and Ausable Bayfield Conservation Foundation, returned as an in-person event on April 20, 2023. The community fundraiser was cancelled in 2020 during the pandemic and held online as a virtual auction in 2021 and 2022. The Dinner Committee organizing the 2023 event said supporters were enthusiastic about its return. There were almost 350 people who attended the auction on April 20. The money raised at the auction event, in addition to a generous \$10,000 individual donation from the Rasenberg family, combined to raise a total of more than \$50,000 for needed projects in local communities.

Dave Frayne is Chair of the Conservation Dinner Committee. He thanked all the donors, patrons and volunteers who made the Conservation Dinner a success. The Conservation Dinner has raised more than \$1.335 million, for the community, over its 33-year history.

Scott Rasenberg presented the \$10,000 donation, on behalf of his family, to Ausable Bayfield Conservation Foundation, at the April 20 community fundraising event. "In this community we are so blessed to have Ausable Bayfield Conservation Foundation and the Exeter Lions Club to help establish a great many memories for everyone's enjoyment," he told the crowd of close to 350 people. "The trail, and the fishing derby at Morrison Dam, have been paramount in building a passion for nature, and for being outdoors, in people of all ages, not only in our community but the community surrounding South Huron," he said. "Over the years, our family members have been fortunate enough to take part in the events held by your organization. We wish to offer our support of this great cause. We thank you for the care you take to maintain local conservation within our community."

The Conservation Foundation supports projects such as commemorative woods, accessible trails and facilities, nature areas and conservation lands and conservation education opportunities for local young people. "I'm at a loss for words," said Brian Horner, General Manager and Secretary-Treasurer of Ausable Bayfield Conservation Authority. "We're very fortunate to have the Rasenberg family in our area," he said. He called the donation an act of amazing generosity.

In addition to more than \$50,000 raised, there was also more than \$6,000, at the April 20 event, in generous individual donations to Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides. After the live auction was completed, Exeter Lions Club Past President Mark Keller invited people to support the Dog Guide program. There were 30 people who volunteered to donate \$200 each towards the cost of having a Dog Guide trained for someone in the area who needs one. Andrea Stevens and Sarah Pelleterio, representatives of Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides, brought dog guides in training to the Conservation Dinner auction event for a demonstration of their exceptional skills.

The money raised at the 33<sup>rd</sup> Conservation Dinner, in 2023, supports local projects. These projects include recreation such as a family-friendly fishing derby, nature education and events, trails and parks and conservation areas, a youth educational bursary award, habitat enhancement for aquatic species, and a summer employment experience for youth to work in the conservation field.

The Conservation Dinner took place at South Huron Recreation Centre in Exeter. The annual charitable event featured live and silent auctions and special raffles and general raffles. 





### Dog Guides Update ting Report

Dog Guides celebrated the graduation of 24 Dog Guide teams during its Spring graduation on April 5, 2023. The **Difference Campaign** focuses on raising funds for Dog Guides' new state-of-the-art training school. Lions' clubs across Canada are making the difference in the future of Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides. Already, 110 Lions clubs have contributed \$1.4 million and donations are arriving every week. The goal is to raise \$25 million with \$4.5 million donated from Lions. Donations can be pledged and paid over 5 years or given as a onetime gift. Donations of \$100 or more from individual Lions will receive a special commemorative pin.

The <u>National Pet Valu Walk for Dog Guides</u>, the foundation's largest annual fundraiser, takes place on Sunday, May 28, 2023. Email <u>Andrea Stevens</u> register a team, support walkers, or find a local walk.

The <u>Ride for Dog Guides</u> takes place on June 24, 2023 starting at the Oakville Dog Guide facility at 10 am and ending at the Breslau facility. Learn more or register for the ride by emailing <u>mailto:events@dogguides.com</u>.

#### District A15 Support for Dog Guides

It costs \$35,000 to raise, train, and place a Dog Guide, which are provided to qualifying Canadians with medical and physical disabilities at no cost. With no government assistance, the foundation relies on fundraising events donations from many sources including Lions Clubs. District A15 Lions Clubs continue to support Dog Guide's to empower Canadians living with disabilities navigate their world with confidence and independence, by providing a Dog Guide at no cost and supporting them in their journey together.

#### **Canadian Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centre (CLERC)**

To all Lions Clubs in Canada,

CLERC is celebrating its 25th year in providing quality eyeglasses to 3rd world countries. This is a milestone shared by all Lions clubs that have supported CLERC during this time. CLERC is a Lions of Canada initiative that profoundly touches more lives than any other project that Lions do. We would like to offer you the opportunity to take part in the success and growth of this life changing initiative.

CLERC has placed eyeglasses on 6.3 million faces in 103 countries around the world. It has partnered with Canadian Vision Care on two Optical Teaching Centres by shipping complete eye testing equipment, edgers and grinding machines that have been donated to CLERC by opticians. In addition, over the past 8 years, CLERC has kept 992,000 lbs. out of landfills allowing the plastic, glass and metal to become viable products. Weekly, a ton of plastic, newsprint and cardboard boxes that we receive shipped glasses in are recycled.

However. processing eyeglasses costs money. To date, Lions in District C-2 in southern Alberta have provided over 94% of the funding. The cost of shipping boxes, drop-off boxes, paper, sanitizing soaps and supplies, have all increased 60%. Gas and maintenance of the CLERC van and truck as well rent for the CLERC warehouse are continuing to increase in price.

The lens meters that read the donated eyeglasses prescriptions are wearing out after eight years of reading more that 3,600 pair per month. Reading the prescriptions is the lifeblood of the process. CLERC urgently needs 3 or 4 new lens meters at a cost of \$10,500 each.

Both the CLERC web site (clerc.ca) and Facebook page will give you much more information on CLERC's activities, the Lions who spend many hours working at processing and shipping eyeglasses, as well as individual cases of those who have been touched by improved sight.

We are asking you to consider being part of the CLERC family. Your club can do this by donating funds to allow CLERC to continue the life changing work that Lions have been challenged to do as Knights of the Blind.
