One Last Walk For Guide Dogs For Fergus Family.....

FERGUS – Larry Wainwright never thought he'd get a guide dog despite becoming legally blind in the 1970s.

Eventually in 2014 however, he got standard poodle Otis to assist him as a vision dog. Together Otis, Larry and his wife Hilda have raised over \$84,000 in pledges for the Maryhill Walk for Dog Guides which supports the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides. "Not too bad for a couple of 80-plus-year-olds and an aging dog missing teeth," Larry said. Larry and Hilda at 85 and 86 years old and Otis a senior dog at 12. They decided this year will be their last time organizing the Maryhill fundraiser walk. "They did one last year in Maryhill and I



was having enough difficulty then ... "I'm starting to realize that I'm old, old and mouldy I guess," Larry joked in an interview at his Fergus home.

The Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides launched in 1983 and offers seven different training programs: vision, hearing, autism assistance, seizure response, service, facility support and diabetes alert. "They've graduated well over 3,500 dogs in this time and I believe there's around 1,400 of us right across Canada that are being serviced by a dog guide," Larry said. Despite thinking he'd never get a guide dog, Larry said he's built a terrific bond with Otis who helped him be a little more independent. "He's not able to do as much right now as he did at the beginning," Hilda pointed out, noting Larry is not as mobile as he used to be. He's been using a walker since he had a bad fall about a year ago which required surgery. This was a major factor that led to the decision to make this their last official walk but they still see the importance of fundraising. Training one dog costs \$35,000, Larry said and there is no government support for the program but there is no cost to the client.



Dogs like Otis have helped a lot of people, Larry said, pointing out examples of a guide dog helping the parents of an eight-year-old child with autism who wandered or alerting the parents of a diabetic child to a medical emergency. "It makes you realize what it's all about," Larry said.

No date or location has been set for the Maryhill walk but walks take place across the country usually in May. Although Larry, Otis and Hilda will no longer be walking or fundraising specifically for this, they are currently working on a way for people to support guide dogs through the three of them.

This photo was taken Saturday, May 4, 2024 at the LFC Meet and Greet of graduating Dog Guides. In the photo is Past Region Chair 51, Lion Jim Davis with seizure response dog, "Davis" named after Lion Jim. After the graduation of Otis and Lion Larry the Ariss and Maryhill Lions Club pledged to raise, at that time \$50,000 to sponsor 6 service dogs. It was decided the 4th, 5th and 6th dogs would be named after the first 3 presidents of the club.Charter President Lion Brian Kurtz, Charter member and Past Region Chair 51 Lion Jim Davis, Past President Lion Neil Perry. Our first dog, a hearing ear dog guide is named "Ariss". Our second dog a canine vision dog guide is named "Cara". Our third dog is "Niels" a disheter awareness.



"Gore". Our third dog is "Nick" a diabetes awareness dog guide, our fourth dog "Kurtz" a special needs, our 5th dog is "Davis" seizure response and our 6th dog will be "Perry" an Autism dog.







ALLAN J. HUNT PAST INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR



Allan Hunt, from Chilliwack, British Columbia, Canada was elected to serve as international director of Lions Clubs International at the association's 102nd International Convention, held in Milan, Italy, July 5 through July 9, 2019. Due to the COVID Pandemic, all Board Members in this era served three years.

Past Director Hunt is retired after 34 years working with NAV CANADA. He was part of

the team that saw NAV CANADA through a transition from government entity to not-for-profit corporation in 1996. During his career he was a manager at various levels of the Canadian air navigation system, at one point managing two air traffic control towers—one of them being the tallest in the world.

A member of the Chilliwack Mount Cheam Lions Club since 1988, he first became a Lion in 1979 as part of the Sandspit Lions Club. He has held many offices within the association including multiple district council chairperson, GLT constitutional area leader, LCIF Constitutional Area Co-Chairperson and every club level office

with the exception of Tail Twister. Past Director Hunt has also

presented and moderated at several USA/Canada Lions


Leadership forums and International Conventions.



Emily Brown is from the Food Bank of Waterloo Region was the guest speaker on April 15 at the K-W Community Spirit Lions dinner meeting.


The members were told there are 58,000 people in Waterloo who are food insecure - one in ten households including 20,000 children.

They act as a food distribution center andfood is delivered to those in need through community partners. Last year 4.5 million pounds of food came from farmers, food manufacturers and the public. Trucks deliver the food to partner agencies. on what they are good at, collecting food and their partners focus on the services they provide to the unhoused, the hungry, and those in need.

There is a special campaign called Full Bellies Happy Hearts who focus on children. The goal is to provide a variety of nutritious options to meet all dietary needs.

The pandemic created an higher need for their services and the need has continued to grow over their 40 year history.
