

An unknown Lion at this point thanked the Copetown Lion Chief Colleen and the Club for hosting the event.



INNERKIP, WOODSTOCK AND PLATTSVILLE LIONS



The Lions of Plattsville, Wood stock and Innerkip participated in Woodstock's annual Coldest Night of the Year event by fundraising and walking to raise money and awareness of those experiencing hurt, hunger and homelessness in our county. This is a National Walk that on the same night in over 250 locations in Canada and the USA, all locations raised over 15 million dollars, each

location raising money for their own local charity. Over 30 Lions clubs (including 2 in the USA) joined their local walks and helped fund-raise.

With Hunger being one the Lions core pillars, Innerkip Lions President David Mair led the way across the entire country, easily out-raising all other clubs with an amazing total amount of \$12,186.00 by soliciting donations from other nearby clubs (including Hickson Lions), plus local residents and small businesses. A list of the top Lions Clubs below.

The Woodstock Coldest Night (CNOY) walk raised a total over \$146,000 for the local charity Operation Sharing, who operate and staff many services including emergency shelters in Woodstock and Tillsonburg, the only emergency shelters in Oxford County.

The Innerkip Lions would like to challenge all Lions clubs in the zone, district, and Country to find one of the 200 Coldest Night of the Year walks in their area next year and get involved. It is a great way to be visible in the community, collaborate with other clubs and raise needed funds. It's also a great way to develop new members by networking with other volunteer and charitable community members.

Coldest Night of Year Walk 2025 In support of Start Me Up Niagara

Six members participated in this year's CNOY walk. Lions Keith, Terry, Jeff and Kim completed the 5km walk in downtown St. Catharines. Lions Natasha and Denise participated in the walk on a route of their choice. Our Merritton Lions Team raised \$2160 in sponsorships and the club matched the first \$2000 raised, bringing our total donation to \$4160. This total put our club in top 5 fundraisers for this year's walk. This is in addition to the \$2000, we donated as an event sponsor.

This year's walk raised a total of \$157,097 for Start me Up Niagara, which represents 89% of their \$175,000 goal. Donations are open until March 31, 2025, so hopefully they will come closer to their goal.

Start Me Up Niagara works with individuals facing significant life challenges such as comprised mental health, addictions, poverty, homelessness and unemployment. They provide opportunities to improve health, increase community integration and support employment.

- 1. Our Natural Environment Plants, Animal Life, Landscape (Urban or Natural), Plant Life or Weather Phenomenon. (no people) (winner: the Lion photographer of the picture)
- 2. Lions in Environment Service People are allowed in these photos highlighting our service work with the environment. May include one paragraph explaining the service. (winner: the club undertaking the environmental service work)

First and Second Place Winners will be chosen from each category

Prizes consist of 1st place - \$100 and 2nd place - \$50 in each category

The photos must measure 8" x 10" (20.3 x 25.4cm), an original, unaltered black and white or colour printed photo. You can send a digital version of your photo to the email address below and state which category the image should be in and who is the photographer and Club but a hard copy version must be sent in as well to the address below by May 9, 2025 for voting at the 2025 MDA Convention hosted by Ripley and District Lions Club in Port Elgin, ON

The contest begins at club level and winning photographs will advance to the district and then to the Multiple District Competition.
